SUMMARY

Jackson Police Department Detective Michael Galbreath is the assigned handler for JPD’s K-9 “Gleeson”. Gleeson has reached a point in his life that it is now time to take him out of active service as a police canine. Consistent with past practice, it is the opinion of the Director of Police and Fire Services Elmer Hitt and Deputy Director Sergio Garcia that Gleeson be released to Det. Galbreath to be his personal pet.

HISTORY, BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

Pursuant to a prior City Council Resolution adopted on December 3, 1997 and the City’s Purchasing Policy, City property must be offered for public sale when no longer required for public purposes. The situation of a police canine, while technically a personal property asset, is clearly unique. It is therefore recommended that the normal procedures for City property disposition should not be followed in the case of such a highly trained police canine. As a result, it is my recommendation to deviate from the requirements of the public sale process and allow Det. Galbreath to retain Gleeson as his personal pet. City Council has previously permitted a similar request by way of Resolution as recently as April of 2015, when “Zygos” was retired and given to retired officer Steve Scarpino. A similar Resolution to accomplish this for Det. Galbreath is attached.

POSITION

I recommend the attached Resolution be approved.

Frequently Asked Questions for Millionaire Party Events

Becoming a Qualified Organization

Q: How do I know whether my organization needs to become qualified to host a Millionaire Party event?

A: All organizations must be qualified through the Michigan Gaming Control Board (MGCB) to hold an event. If your organization has never conducted a licensed Millionaire Party event or has not held a licensed Millionaire Party event during the past five or more years, please refer to the [qualifications process](#) on the MGCB website. At times, the Board may require an already qualified organization to submit updated documentation to maintain qualification status.

Q: What types of organizations may become qualified with the Board?

A: An organization may be eligible to become qualified if it is a bona fide religious, educational, service, senior citizens, fraternal or veterans' organization operating without profit to its members. Additionally, it must either have existed continuously as an organization for a period of five years or is exempt from taxation under section 501(c) of the Internal Revenue code.

Q: What category of organization would my group fall under?

A: Some examples of organizations qualified with the MGCB are:

Religious – churches

Educational – schools, including public, private and charter

Service – Kiwanis Club, Lions Club

Service (Local Civic) – sports clubs, school groups, animal rescues, auxiliary groups

Senior Citizens – organizations with at least 15 members over the age of 60 that exist for the mutual support and advancement of the causes of elderly or retired persons

Fraternal – Eagles, Shriners, K of C, Knights of Templar

Veterans – VFW, AMVETS

The definition of the organization type is displayed at the bottom of the requirements page of each application type. Please review the definition when choosing which application to submit to ensure it applies to the organization.

Q: How does my organization become a qualified organization with the Michigan Gaming Control Board?

A: Organizations must complete a [Millionaire Party Qualification Form](#) and provide required documents including but not limited to bylaws, Articles of Incorporation, bank statements, financial documents and Internal Revenue Service tax exempt status. In addition, a mandatory on-site meeting between the organization's officers and a representative of the MGCB is required.

Note: Please allow a minimum of eight weeks' processing time after all requested documents have been received. You must be a qualified organization prior to applying for a Millionaire Party event license.

Q: Is there a fee to become a qualified organization?

A: No, there is no fee to become a qualified organization. However, a license fee is charged for holding a licensed Millionaire Party event.

Millionaire Party Event Application

Q: How does my organization apply for a Millionaire Party event?

A: If you recently completed the qualification process, you must FIRST receive notice from the MGCB indicating the qualification review is complete and your organization is now considered a qualified organization. To apply for a Millionaire Party event, a qualified organization must complete and submit an event application a minimum of six weeks before the proposed event date along with the appropriate fee (\$50 per event day). The organization must provide required documents with the application such as a demarcated area diagram, location rental agreement, equipment provider agreement, and workers' list. If you are a Millionaire Party (MP) portal user, you may apply within the portal. A link to the MP portal may be found on the MGCB Millionaire Party Event Application [page](#).

Q: How many licensed events can my organization host annually?

A: A qualified organization may receive up to four licenses per calendar year. Each license may be issued for up to four consecutive days per event and costs \$50 per day. For example, if you elect to have a four-day event, your license fee will be \$200.

Q: Where can I hold my event?

A: The event can be held at your organization's own location, or your organization may choose to rent a facility to hold your event. The event location must be indicated on your Millionaire Party Event Application for approval.

Q: How can I see the status of my Millionaire Party license application?

A: You may check the [License Application Status Lookup tool](#) on our website for a current status on your application. A link to this tool also may be found on the MGCB Millionaire Party [home page](#). If you are a MP portal user, you can review the application tabs to see your event's status. A licensed event will be displayed on the Licensed tab in the MP portal.

Event Staffing

Q: Who can work/assist at the event?

A: Under the MGCB's Administrative Rules ([R432.310\(6\)](#)), the qualified organization shall have at least two bona-fide members over the age of 18 working an event at all times. The organization will designate at least one of those persons as the chairperson. The chairperson is in charge and responsible for the conduct of the licensed gaming event. The two members must be listed on Attachment A of the event application along with their home addresses, roles in the organization, and telephone numbers.

In addition, if your organization is a directorship, only Board Members may chair and work the event.

Q: Who can be chairperson at my event?

A: The chairperson must be a bona fide member of the qualified organization for at least six months, over the age of 18 and serves as a millionaire party chairperson for only one qualified organization in a calendar year. If your organization is a school, the chairperson must be a staff member. If your organization is a directorship, only a Board Member may be a chairperson.

Q: Is there an age requirement to work at an event?

A: Event workers must be 18 years of age or older. Anyone participating in the event, including players, must be 18 years of age or older.

Q: Who can be a dealer at my event?

A: A qualified organization may have its own bona fide members serve as dealers at a millionaire party event, or it may hire dealers from a licensed supplier. If using your own members as dealers, the event application must include a list of the dealers who will work at the proposed event (on Attachment B). The Millionaire Party event application may be denied if a dealer has ever been convicted of, forfeited bond upon a charge of, or pled guilty to the following:

- (a) A felony
- (b) A gambling offense
- (c) Criminal fraud
- (d) Forgery

- (e) Larceny
- (f) Filing a false report with a governmental agency

Changes: Event Changes, Cancelations and Organizational Changes

Q: How do I request a change for my Millionaire Party event?

A: A qualified organization must submit a [License Change Form](#) to request a change in the location, supplier and event date and/or time no less than 20 days before the event start date. If you are a MP portal user, you may submit a request to edit your event from the Pending MGCB Decision or Licensed tab no less than 20 days before the event start date.

Q: How do I cancel my Millionaire Party event?

A: If cancelled, a qualified organization must notify the MGCB **prior** to the event in writing. An email may be sent to millionaireparty@michigan.gov. If the event license already has been issued, you must return the original license with your request. A refund then will be issued for the license fee. If you are a MP portal user, you may submit a request to withdraw from the Pending MGCB Decision tab or Cancel Event from the Licensed tab. The request must be made prior to the event.

Q: Do I have to notify the MGCB whenever our principal officer changes?

A: Yes, please complete a [Qualified Organization Information Change Form](#) found on our website to update the information. Each principal officer also must review the [Millionaire Party Guide for Qualified Organizations \(Charities\)](#) and sign a Certificate of Completion.

Q: How does my organization update the MGCB on changes such as our address, officers or by-laws?

A: Complete the [Qualified Organization Information Change Form](#) to update organization information. If changes or updates have occurred on the Qualified Organization's legal documents (e.g., by-laws or Articles of Incorporation), please submit the updated documents to the MGCB. To use the MP Portal, complete the [Officer/Contact Information](#) form.

ORDINANCE NO. 2023-03

An Ordinance amending Chapter 28 – Zoning, Sections 28-5, 28-100, 28-130, and 28-253 to revise the definition of nonconforming lots, buildings, signs, structures, and uses of buildings, structures, and land.

THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF JACKSON ORDAIN:

Section 1. Purpose.

The City Council adopts this ordinance amending Sections 28-5, 28-100, 28-130, and 28-253, Chapter 28 of the City of Jackson Code of Ordinance to revise what is considered a nonconforming lot, building, sign, structure, and uses of buildings, structures, and land.

Section 2. That Chapter 28 of the City of Jackson Code of Ordinances be amended as follows:

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

Sec. 28-5. – Definitions.

Structure means anything constructed or erected, the use of which requires permanent location on the ground, or attachment to something having a permanent location on the ground.

ARTICLE IV. SITE AND BUILDING DESIGN STANDARDS

Sec. 28-100. – Off-street parking, loading, and access design standards.

(g) *Off-street parking space layout standards, construction and maintenance.*

(1) *Curbs.*

c. *Existing commercial and industrial use.* If the property is determined to be abandoned or discontinued for a period of twelve (12) consecutive months or more, or, if the damage, repair, alteration or improvement costs to the building or structure meets or exceeds one hundred (100) percent of the taxable value, or any expansion, reduction, resurfacing, replacement, or reconstruction of greater than or equal to twenty-five (25) percent of the existing designated off-street parking area then;

1. *Corner lots:* Curbing shall be required in all addressed and non-addressed front yards and designated side yards.

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2. *Interior lots:* Curbing shall be required for all parking areas located in the designated front yard and along public rights-of-way. At the discretion of the zoning administrator (or designee) curbing may be required for parking areas located in the designated side yard and rear yard based on the abutting or adjoining property use or condition.
 3. *All lots:* All interior islands and access aisles shall be curbed.

ARTICLE V. DEVELOPMENT APPROVAL PROCEDURES

Sec. 28-130. - Nonconforming lots, buildings, signs, structures, and uses of buildings, structures and land.

(a) *Purpose and Intent.*

- (1) *Nonconformities Permitted.* It is recognized that there exists within zoning districts, established by this Chapter, certain lots, buildings, structures, site improvements, and uses which were lawful before this Chapter was passed or amended, which would be prohibited, regulated, or restricted under the terms of this Chapter. It is the intent of this Chapter to permit these nonconforming lots, buildings, structures, and uses to continue until they are altered, abandoned, removed, or brought into conformance, but not to encourage their continued use or survival.
- (2) *Site Improvements.* Encourage gradual upgrading to a more conforming status of site and parking lot landscaping, parking (quantity and surface materials), paving/curbing, signage or other features of a site which were developed in compliance with the standards at the time of their construction, but which do not meet the current site plan or other standards of this Chapter and its amendments.
- (3) *No Expansion of Nonconformities.* Nonconforming lots, buildings, structures, and uses are hereby declared to be incompatible with the zoning districts in which they are located. It is the intent of this Chapter that these nonconformities shall not be enlarged upon, expanded, or extended, nor be used as grounds for adding other buildings, structures or uses prohibited elsewhere in the zoning district, except as may be provided for in this Chapter.
- (4) *Construction Prior to Effective Date of this Chapter.* Nothing in this Chapter shall be deemed to require a change in the plans, construction, or designated use of any building on which actual construction was lawfully begun prior to the effective date of this Chapter, or an amendment thereto, and upon which actual building construction has been diligently conducted.
- (5) *Acquisition of Nonconformities.* The City may acquire, through purchase or condemnation, private nonconforming lots, buildings, structures, and uses. The City Council may take actions related to acquisition in the manner provided for by law.

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- (6) If a nonconformity existing prior to the effective date on this Chapter becomes conforming because of the adoption of this Chapter, or any subsequent amendment, then it shall no longer have a nonconforming status. A condition that was not a nonconformity prior to the effective date of this Chapter does not achieve any nonconforming status under this Chapter by repeal of the previous Chapter.
- (b) *Replacement with a conforming use.* If a nonconforming use of a building or structure, or land is replaced with a permitted use for the district, all buildings or structures, land, and site design shall thereafter conform to the standard, regulations, and requirements of this Chapter for the district in which such buildings or structures, land, and site is located. The nonconforming use shall not thereafter be resumed.
- (c) *Nonconforming Lot of Record.*
- (1) *Use Permitted.*
- a. A nonconforming lot may be used for any use permitted in the zoning district, subject to any approvals required by this Chapter, provided that all placement, height and other applicable regulations related to the building are met, except as noted below in Subsection b.
- b. A side yard requirement for a building or structure on a nonconforming lot may be reduced by the same percentage the area of the lot bears to the zoning district requirements. For example, a lot that is twenty (20) percent less than the minimum lot area may reduce the required side yard by twenty (20) percent, provided that no side yard shall be less than five (5) feet.
- (2) *Contiguous Nonconforming Lots in Common Ownership.*
- a. Any two (2) or more nonconforming lots of record or combination of lots and portions of lots of record, existing prior to the effective date of this Chapter, or an amendment thereto, shall be considered to be an undivided parcel for the purposes of this Chapter if they:
1. Are in common ownership; and
 2. Have continuous frontage; and
 3. Individually do not meet the lot width or lot area requirements of this Chapter.
- b. Parcels meeting these requirements shall be combined into a lot or lots complying as nearly as possible with the lot width and lot size requirements of this Chapter. No portion of that parcel shall be used or divided in a manner that further diminishes compliance with lot width and area requirements of this Chapter.
- (d) *Nonconforming Buildings or Structures.*
- (1) *Continuation.* Where a lawful structure exists at the effective date of adoption or amendment of this Chapter, but could not be built under the terms of this Chapter by reason of restrictions on area, lot coverage, height, yards, or other characteristics of the

structure or its location on the lot, such structure may be continued so long as it remains otherwise lawful

- (2) *Extensions or Expansion.* No such building or structure may be enlarged or altered in a way that increases its nonconformity without the granting of a variance from the Zoning Board of Appeals (see Section 28-238 of this Chapter). Such buildings or structures may be enlarged or altered in a way that does not increase its nonconformity.
- (3) *Expansion of a nonconforming residential building.* A nonconforming residential building may be expanded into a required yard in a manner that does not comply with the setback standards with approval from the zoning administrator or chief building official, provided it is also in accordance with the following standards:
 - a. The expansion does not extend closer to the lot line than any existing, nonconforming part of the structure;
 - b. The expansion does not create a new nonconformity on the lot or an adjacent lot.
 - c. The addition may be constructed up to the front or rear block building line (see Section 28-5 of this Chapter for the definition of "block building line, front or rear") when more than fifty (50) percent of the principal structures on one (1) side of the street in any one (1) block do not meet the required front or rear yard setbacks.
 - d. The addition may be constructed into the required side yard providing it remains in compliance with Section 28-81, side yard exceptions in R districts.
 - e. The addition retains compliance with all other setback, lot coverage, and height requirements;
 - f. The addition will meet all minimum building code requirements;
 - g. The resultant addition, in terms of dimensions and design, would be compatible with the established character of the neighborhood;
 - h. The design of the addition must be compatible with the existing structure and not detract from the appearance of the site;
 - i. The expansion of a residential building with a nonconforming yard, not meeting the requirements above, is prohibited unless a variance is granted by the Zoning Board of Appeals (see Section 28-238 of this Chapter).
- (4) *Alteration or Modification.* Should such building or structure be altered or modified so as to eliminate, remove or lessen any or all of its nonconforming characteristics, then such nonconforming characteristics cannot be later reestablished or increased.
- (5) *Moving a nonconforming structure.* Should such building or structure be moved for any reason for any distance, it must thereafter conform to the regulations for the district in which it is located after it is moved. This does not affect the right to replace, restore, or reconstruct an accessory structure provided it meets all of the other requirements of this Chapter [see Subsection 28-120(2)(b)].

(e) *Nonconforming Use of Buildings or Structures.*

- (1) *Extension within a Building.* Any nonconforming use may be extended throughout any parts of a building which were manifestly arranged or designed for that use at the time of adoption or amendment of this Chapter and would have been permitted by right, but the use shall not be extended to occupy any land outside the building.
- (2) *Reduction in Nonconforming Use.* If any part of a nonconforming use is moved or reduced in size by action of the owner, the part of the nonconforming use that is moved or reduced in size shall be considered to be abandoned and any subsequent use shall conform to the requirements of this Chapter.
- (3) *Abandonment.*
 - a. If a nonconforming use of a building or structure is abandoned or discontinued for any reason for a period greater than twelve (12) consecutive months, any subsequent use of the building or structure shall conform to the requirements of this Chapter.
 - b. A nonconforming use of a building or structure shall be determined to be abandoned or discontinued if the City is in receipt of a written declaration by the property owner that the nonconforming use of the building or structure will not be continued, or if two (2) or more of the following conditions exist that demonstrate intent on the part of the property owner to abandon or discontinue the nonconforming use of the building or structure:
 1. Foreclosure;
 2. One (1) or more utility meters, such as water, gas, or electricity to the property, have been removed, disconnected, or shut-off;
 3. The property, buildings and/or grounds are unsafe or unsanitary, as described in Chapter 14 Housing or Chapter 17 Nuisances;
 4. Cessation of the nonconforming use or business operations during the abandonment or discontinuance period;
 5. Removal of signs or other indications of the existence of the nonconforming use;
 6. Removal of equipment or fixtures necessary for the operation of the nonconforming use;
 7. Failure to maintain current licenses, certificates, permits, registrations or other appropriate documentation; or
 8. Other actions which constitute an intention by the property owner or lessee to abandon or discontinue the nonconforming use.

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- c. *Exceptions.*
1. Abandonment will not be considered only when a property owner can provide documentation demonstrating a good faith effort to actively sell or lease the premises for a use less intense by function or operation than the previous nonconforming use. This exception shall not apply to discontinued nonconforming uses except as otherwise specifically set forth in this section.
- (4) *Change to Other Nonconforming Use of Buildings or Structures.* Prior to a determination of abandonment or discontinuance, a nonconforming use shall only be changed to another nonconforming use provided the Zoning Board of Appeals makes all of the following determinations.
- a. The proposed use is equally compatible, or more compatible, with the surrounding neighborhood, and that the use is equal to or more conforming to the uses allowed in the zoning district than the previous nonconforming use.
 - b. The proposed nonconforming use is not enlarged or increased, nor extended to occupy a greater area of land than the previous nonconforming use, except as may otherwise be permitted by the Zoning Board of Appeals.
 - c. That buildings and area encompassing the expansion of the nonconforming use complies with all parking, landscaping, or other site development regulations applicable to the area affected by the proposed enlargement, increase or extension of use area as required by this Chapter.
- (f) *Nonconforming Uses of Land.* The lawful use of any land not involving a building or structure, existing and lawful on the effective date of this Chapter or amendment thereto, may be continued even though such use does not conform to the provisions of this Chapter or amendments, subject to the following provisions:
- (1) *Enlargement or Increase.*
- a. No nonconforming use of land not involving a building or structure shall be enlarged or increased, nor extended to occupy a greater area of land than was occupied when the use became nonconforming, except as may be permitted by the Zoning of Board Appeals.
 - b. In determining if the proposed enlargement, increase, or greater area shall be permitted, the Zoning of Board Appeals shall find that if approved, the use shall:
 1. The use has not lost its nonconforming status due to abandonment;
 2. Not have a substantial detrimental effect on the use and enjoyment of adjacent uses or lots;
 3. Comply with all parking, sign, or other applicable regulations for accessory uses for the area affected by the proposed enlargement, increase, or greater area;
 4. Not occupy an area larger than twenty-five (25) percent of the original nonconforming area.

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- c. The Zoning Board of Appeals may impose reasonable conditions that are necessary to ensure that the proposed enlargement, increase, or greater area shall not prove detrimental to adjacent properties, the neighborhood, or the community.
- (2) *Relocations.* No such nonconforming use can be moved to any other portion of the lot occupied by such use on the effective date of this Chapter, or amendments thereto.
- (3) *Abandonment.*
- a. If a nonconforming use of land not involving a building or structure is abandoned or discontinued for any reason for a period greater than twelve (12) consecutive months, any subsequent use of the land not involving a building or structure shall conform to the requirements of this Chapter.
- b. A nonconforming use of the land not involving a building or structure shall be determined to be abandoned or discontinued if the City is in receipt of a written declaration by the property owner that the nonconforming use of the land not involving a building or structure will not be continued, or if two (2) or more of the following conditions exist that demonstrate intent on the part of the property owner to abandon or discontinue the nonconforming use of the land not involving a building or structure:
1. Foreclosure;
 2. One (1) or more utility meters, such as water, gas, or electricity to the property, have been removed, disconnected, or shut-off;
 3. The property and/or grounds are unsafe or unsanitary, as described in Chapter 14 Housing or Chapter 17 Nuisances;
 4. Cessation of the nonconforming use or business operations during the abandonment or discontinuance period;
 5. Removal of signs or other indications of the existence of the nonconforming use;
 6. Removal of equipment for the operation of the nonconforming use;
 7. Failure to maintain current licenses, certificates, permits, registrations or other appropriate documentation; or
 8. Other actions which constitute an intention by the property owner or lessee to abandon or discontinue the nonconforming use.
- c. *Exceptions.*
1. Abandonment will not be considered only when a property owner can provide documentation demonstrating a good faith effort to actively sell or lease the premises for a use less intense by function or operation than the previous nonconforming use. This exception shall not apply to discontinued nonconforming uses except as otherwise specifically set forth in this section.

(4) *Change to Other Nonconforming Use of Land.* Prior to a determination of abandonment or discontinuance, a nonconforming use shall only be changed to another nonconforming use provided the Zoning Board of Appeals makes all of the following determinations.

- a. The proposed use is equally compatible, or more compatible, with the surrounding neighborhood, and that the use is equal to or more conforming to the uses allowed in the zoning district than the previous nonconforming use.
- b. The proposed nonconforming use is not enlarged or increased, nor extended to occupy a greater area of land than the previous nonconforming use, except as may otherwise be permitted by the Zoning Board of Appeals.
- c. That buildings and area encompassing the expansion of the nonconforming use complies with all parking, landscaping, or other site development regulations applicable to the area affected by the proposed enlargement, increase or extension of use area as required by this Chapter.

(g) *Repairs, Replacement, Alterations, or Improvements.*

(1) *Nonconforming Commercial or Industrial uses, structures or buildings.*

- a. Should the total costs of repairs, replacement, alterations, or improvements to a nonconforming use, building or structure, for any reason, be less than or equal to seventy-four (74) percent of the assessed value of the building or structure, it may be repaired, replaced, altered, or improved in its previously nonconforming location, provided that:
 1. The dimensional characteristics of the building as it existed at the time of passage or amendment of this Chapter is not increased. This does not allow for the separation or expansion of utility systems; and
 2. The building, structure or use has not lost its nonconforming status due to abandonment.
- b. Should the total costs of repairs, replacement, alterations, or improvements to a nonconforming use, building or structure, for any reason, be greater than or equal to seventy-five (75) percent of the assessed value of the building or structure,, it shall be repaired, replaced, altered, or improved only in conformance with the provisions of this Chapter.

(2) *Nonconforming one-family uses, structures or buildings.* A nonconforming one-family detached dwelling and its accessory structures in any zoning districts may be continued, replaced, or repaired if damaged by fire, vandalism, flood or other force of nature, if approved by the zoning administrator or chief building official. Such approval requires a finding that the resulting building footprint and height will be the same size or smaller than that of the building or structure before such change. Replacement of a nonconforming one-family building or structure must commence within one (1) year of the date of damage and work must be diligently pursued toward completion. Failure to complete replacement or diligently work toward completion, or use of the building for

a conforming non-residential use for any period of time, will result in the loss of nonconforming status unless good cause for the delay or temporary change in use is accepted by the zoning administrator or building official.

- (3) *Assessed Value.* For the purposes of enforcing the regulations contained in this section, the value (see the definition in Section 28-5 of this Chapter) of the structure will be determined by the most recent valuation of the structure for the purposes of taxation.
- (4) *Ordinary Repair/Maintenance.* Nothing in this section prevents ordinary repair/maintenance, or the strengthening or restoring to a safe condition of any building or structure, or part thereof, deemed to be unsafe by an official charged with protecting the public safety, upon order of such official.

(h) *Nonconforming Site Design.*

- (1) *Purpose.* This Section permits reviews of applications for improvements and minor modifications to a nonconforming lot, building, structure or use that does not require a site to meet all of the site improvement regulations, requirements, and standards of this Chapter. Where appropriate, the intent is to allow gradual compliance with site-related requirements for sites that pre-date requirements for landscaping, surface treatment for parking areas or drives, curbing and other non-safety site-related items provided in Article IV.
- (2) *Improvements or Modifications.* Improvements or modifications to nonconforming site design may be administratively approved through the site plan review process without a complete upgrade of all site elements under the following conditions:
 - a. The applicant provides reasonable site improvements to the site in relation to the scale and construction cost of the building improvements or expansion;
 - b. The applicant addresses any safety-related site issues for the site;
 - c. The improvements or minor expansion do not increase the nonconforming site elements;
 - d. The applicant upgrades the site landscaping consistent with Section 28-105, to the degree deemed appropriate by the zoning administrator or chief building official; and
 - e. Driveways that do not conform to the access management requirements of this Chapter are eliminated, provided that minimum reasonable access is maintained.
- (3) *Compliance Required.* Site design standards and requirements shall be brought into full compliance with this Chapter, except as may otherwise be permitted by the Zoning Board of Appeals, if any of the following occur:
 - a. Change from nonconforming use to a permitted use.
 - 1. See Section 28-130(b).

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- b. *Parking Lot/Area.* Any expansion, reduction, resurfacing, replacement, or reconstruction of greater than or equal to twenty-five (25) percent of the existing designated off-street parking area shall require all new, existing, and/or remaining off-street parking area(s), maneuvering lanes, and ingress and egress meet the standards and requirements of Article IV. This does not include general maintenance; i.e. sealcoating.
 - c. Modification, alteration, replacement, or expansion of existing landscape areas (trees, shrubs, ground cover, or similar materials). This shall also include all proposed landscape installations.
 - d. Replacement of nonconforming exterior light fixtures, light poles, or combination thereof shall meet the requirement of Section 28-109.
- (4) Nothing in this Section shall be construed to require the removal of vegetation preserved as part of the original construction of the landscaped area.
 - (5) In all instances, required screening walls for waste receptacles, fencing of outdoor storage or screening from adjacent residential uses shall be provided.
 - (6) The City may require a performance guarantee under the provisions of Section 28-165 to insure that all improvements required in this Section are made in accordance with the approved plan.
- (i) *Nonconforming signs.*
 - (2) The goal is to eliminate nonconforming signs, except as otherwise specifically set forth in this section. Any lawfully erected sign, which is made unlawful by this chapter, may continue exactly as the sign existed at the time when the sign became unlawful under the provisions of this Chapter. However, following ninety (90) days after the discontinuance of the previously approved use associated with the sign, sign panels shall be replaced with blank panels and any interior lighting shall be disconnected. Twelve (12) months after discontinuance, the sign structure shall be removed.
 - (3) No nonconforming sign shall:
 - a. Be changed to another nonconforming sign without a variance;
 - b. Be structurally altered so as to change the shape, size, type or design of the sign;
 - c. Be re-established after the activity, business or use to which it relates has been discontinued for ninety (90) days or longer.
 - (4) Ordinary repair/maintenance.
 - a. The provisions of this Chapter shall not apply to the ordinary repair/maintenance of existing signs or changing of sign panels or to the altering of a sign specifically designed for periodic change of message without change in sign structure, such as a bulletin board or similar type of sign. The replacement of a manual changeable message sign with a digital message sign is specifically excluded from this provision.

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- b. Repairs may be done to a nonconforming sign to an extent not exceeding fifty (50%) percent of the value of the sign, provided that:
 - i. The dimensional characteristics of the sign as it existed at the time of passage or amendment of this Chapter is not increased; and
 - ii. The sign has not lost its nonconforming status due to vacancy, discontinuance or abandonment.
 - c. In the event that any nonconforming sign requires ordinary repair/maintenance for any reason and in any manner that exceeds fifty (50%) percent of the value of the sign, such repairs shall be permitted only in conformity with the provisions of this Chapter. However, if complying with this Chapter is unfeasible and/or impractical, a property owner may seek a variance from the Zoning Board of Appeals (see Section 28-238 of this Chapter), assuming it can also be demonstrated that the original structure was consistent with the established character of the area.
- (j) Nonconforming medical and adult use marihuana facility uses. Medical and adult use marihuana facilities, including a grower, provisioning center, retailer, safety compliance facility, secure transporter, microbusiness, or any marihuana facility or establishment of any type, other than that of a licensed caregiver operating within the limits of the Michigan Medical Marihuana Act, which may have been established prior to the effective date of this ordinance, but which have not gained a license from both the State of Michigan and the City of Jackson shall not be considered nonconforming uses. In addition, no marihuana facilities may be permitted as a home occupation or accessory use.

ARTICLE IX. SIGN REGULATIONS

Sec. 28-253. – Signs subject to permit or other approvals

The signs outlined in the following table are subject to a permit or other approval as indicated. Unless stated otherwise within the article, all other sign types are exempt from the permit requirements. The design requirements and other provisions for such sign are also prescribed. Permit application requirements are found in section 28-254. These signs include the following and are defined in section 28-5.

ARTICLE V. DEVELOPMENT APPROVAL PROCEDURES

Sec. 28-130. - Nonconforming lots, buildings, signs, structures, and uses of buildings, structures and land.

(a) *Purpose and Intent.*

- (1) *Nonconformities Permitted.* It is recognized that there exists within zoning districts, established by this Chapter, certain lots, buildings, structures, site improvements, and uses which were lawful before this Chapter was passed or amended, which would be prohibited, regulated, or restricted under the terms of this Chapter. It is the intent of this Chapter to permit these nonconforming lots, buildings, structures, and uses to continue until they are altered, abandoned, removed, or brought into conformance, but not to encourage their continued use or survival.
- (2) *Site Improvements.* Encourage gradual upgrading to a more conforming status of site and parking lot landscaping, parking (quantity and surface materials), paving/curbing, signage or other features of a site which were developed in compliance with the standards at the time of their construction, but which do not meet the current site plan or other standards of this Chapter and its amendments.
- (3) *No Expansion of Nonconformities.* Nonconforming lots, buildings, structures, and uses are hereby declared to be incompatible with the zoning districts in which they are located. It is the intent of this Chapter that these nonconformities shall not be enlarged upon, expanded, or extended, nor be used as grounds for adding other buildings, structures or uses prohibited elsewhere in the zoning district, except as may be provided for in this Chapter.
- (4) *Construction Prior to Effective Date of this Chapter.* Nothing in this Chapter shall be deemed to require a change in the plans, construction, or designated use of any building on which actual construction was lawfully begun prior to the effective date of this Chapter, or an amendment thereto, and upon which actual building construction has been diligently conducted.
- (5) *Acquisition of Nonconformities.* The City may acquire, through purchase or condemnation, private nonconforming lots, buildings, structures, and uses. The City Council may take actions related to acquisition in the manner provided for by law.
- (6) If a nonconformity existing prior to the effective date on this Chapter becomes conforming because of the adoption of this Chapter, or any subsequent amendment, then it shall no longer have a nonconforming status. A condition that was not a nonconformity prior to the effective date of this Chapter does not achieve any nonconforming status under this Chapter by repeal of the previous Chapter.

- (b) *Replacement with a conforming use.* If a nonconforming use of a building or structure, or land is replaced with a permitted use for the district, all buildings or structures, land, and site design shall thereafter conform to the standard, regulations, and requirements of this Chapter for the district in which such buildings or structures, land, and site is located. The nonconforming use shall not thereafter be resumed.

(c) *Nonconforming Lot of Record.*

(1) *Use Permitted.*

- a. A nonconforming lot may be used for any use permitted in the zoning district, subject to any approvals required by this Chapter, provided that all placement, height and other applicable regulations related to the building are met, except as noted below in Subsection b.

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- b. A side yard requirement for a building or structure on a nonconforming lot may be reduced by the same percentage the area of the lot bears to the zoning district requirements. For example, a lot that is twenty (20) percent less than the minimum lot area may reduce the required side yard by twenty (20) percent, provided that no side yard shall be less than five (5) feet.
- (2) *Contiguous Nonconforming Lots in Common Ownership.*
- a. Any two (2) or more nonconforming lots of record or combination of lots and portions of lots of record, existing prior to the effective date of this Chapter, or an amendment thereto, shall be considered to be an undivided parcel for the purposes of this Chapter if they:
1. Are in common ownership; and
 2. Have continuous frontage; and
 3. Individually do not meet the lot width or lot area requirements of this Chapter.
- b. Parcels meeting these requirements shall be combined into a lot or lots complying as nearly as possible with the lot width and lot size requirements of this Chapter. No portion of that parcel shall be used or divided in a manner that further diminishes compliance with lot width and area requirements of this Chapter.
- (d) *Nonconforming Buildings or Structures.*
- (1) *Continuation.* Where a lawful structure exists at the effective date of adoption or amendment of this Chapter, but could not be built under the terms of this Chapter by reason of restrictions on area, lot coverage, height, yards, or other characteristics of the structure or its location on the lot, such structure may be continued so long as it remains otherwise lawful
- (2) *Extensions or Expansion.* No such building or structure may be enlarged or altered in a way that increases its nonconformity without the granting of a variance from the Zoning Board of Appeals (see Section 28-238 of this Chapter). Such buildings or structures may be enlarged or altered in a way that does not increase its nonconformity.
- (3) *Expansion of a nonconforming residential building.* A nonconforming residential building may be expanded into a required yard in a manner that does not comply with the setback standards with approval from the zoning administrator or chief building official, provided it is also in accordance with the following standards:
- a. The expansion does not extend closer to the lot line than any existing, nonconforming part of the structure;
 - b. The expansion does not create a new nonconformity on the lot or an adjacent lot.
 - c. The addition may be constructed up to the front or rear block building line (see Section 28-5 of this Chapter for the definition of "block building line, front or rear") when more than fifty (50) percent of the principal structures on one (1) side of the street in any one (1) block do not meet the required front or rear yard setbacks.
 - d. The addition may be constructed into the required side yard providing it remains in compliance with Section 28-81, side yard exceptions in R districts.
 - e. The addition retains compliance with all other setback, lot coverage, and height requirements;
 - f. The addition will meet all minimum building code requirements;
 - g. The resultant addition, in terms of dimensions and design, would be compatible with the established character of the neighborhood;
 - h. The design of the addition must be compatible with the existing structure and not detract from the appearance of the site;
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- i. The expansion of a residential building with a nonconforming yard, not meeting the requirements above, is prohibited unless a variance is granted by the Zoning Board of Appeals (see Section 28-238 of this Chapter).
 - (4) *Alteration or Modification.* Should such building or structure be altered or modified so as to eliminate, remove or lessen any or all of its nonconforming characteristics, then such nonconforming characteristics cannot be later reestablished or increased.
 - (5) *Moving a nonconforming structure.* Should such building or structure be moved for any reason for any distance, it must thereafter conform to the regulations for the district in which it is located after it is moved. This does not affect the right to replace, restore, or reconstruct an accessory structure provided it meets all of the other requirements of this Chapter [see Subsection 28-120(2)(b)].
- (e) *Nonconforming Use of Buildings or Structures.*
- (1) *Extension within a Building.* Any nonconforming use may be extended throughout any parts of a building which were manifestly arranged or designed for that use at the time of adoption or amendment of this Chapter and would have been permitted by right, but the use shall not be extended to occupy any land outside the building.
 - (2) *Reduction in Nonconforming Use.* If any part of a nonconforming use is moved or reduced in size by action of the owner, the part of the nonconforming use that is moved or reduced in size shall be considered to be abandoned and any subsequent use shall conform to the requirements of this Chapter.
 - (3) *Abandonment.*
 - a. If a nonconforming use of a building or structure is abandoned or discontinued for any reason for a period greater than twelve (12) consecutive months, any subsequent use of the building or structure shall conform to the requirements of this Chapter.
 - b. A nonconforming use of a building or structure shall be determined to be abandoned or discontinued if the City is in receipt of a written declaration by the property owner that the nonconforming use of the building or structure will not be continued, or if two (2) or more of the following conditions exist that demonstrate intent on the part of the property owner to abandon or discontinue the nonconforming use of the building or structure:
 - 1. Foreclosure;

 - 5. Removal of signs or other indications of the existence of the nonconforming use;
 - 6. Removal of equipment or fixtures necessary for the operation of the nonconforming use;
 - 7. Failure to maintain current licenses, certificates, permits, registrations or other appropriate documentation; or
 - 8. Other actions which constitute an intention by the property owner or lessee to abandon or discontinue the nonconforming use.
 - c. *Exceptions.*
 - 1. Abandonment will not be considered only when a property owner can provide documentation demonstrating a good faith effort to actively sell or lease the premises for a use less intense
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by function or operation than the previous nonconforming use. This exception shall not apply to discontinued nonconforming uses except as otherwise specifically set forth in this section.

- (4) *Change to Other Nonconforming Use of Buildings or Structures.* Prior to a determination of abandonment or discontinuance, a nonconforming use shall only be changed to another nonconforming use provided the Zoning Board of Appeals makes all of the following determinations.
- a. The proposed use is equally compatible, or more compatible, with the surrounding neighborhood, and that the use is equal to or more conforming to the uses allowed in the zoning district than the previous nonconforming use.
 - b. The proposed nonconforming use is not enlarged or increased, nor extended to occupy a greater area of land than the previous nonconforming use, except as may otherwise be permitted by the Zoning Board of Appeals.
 - c. That buildings and area encompassing the expansion of the nonconforming use complies with all parking, landscaping, or other site development regulations applicable to the area affected by the proposed enlargement, increase or extension of use area as required by this Chapter.
- (f) *Nonconforming Uses of Land.* The lawful use of any land not involving a building or structure, existing and lawful on the effective date of this Chapter or amendment thereto, may be continued even though such use does not conform to the provisions of this Chapter or amendments, subject to the following provisions:
- (1) *Enlargement or Increase.*
 - a. No nonconforming use of land not involving a building or structure shall be enlarged or increased, nor extended to occupy a greater area of land than was occupied when the use became nonconforming, except as may be permitted by the Zoning of Board Appeals.
 - b. In determining if the proposed enlargement, increase, or greater area shall be permitted, the Zoning of Board Appeals shall find that if approved, the use shall:
 1. The use has not lost its nonconforming status due to abandonment;
 2. Not have a substantial detrimental effect on the use and enjoyment of adjacent uses or lots;
 3. Comply with all parking, sign, or other applicable regulations for accessory uses for the area affected by the proposed enlargement, increase, or greater area;
 4. Not occupy an area larger than twenty-five (25) percent of the original nonconforming area.
 - c. The Zoning Board of Appeals may impose reasonable conditions that are necessary to ensure that the proposed enlargement, increase, or greater area shall not prove detrimental to adjacent properties, the neighborhood, or the community.
 - (2) *Relocations.* No such nonconforming use can be moved to any other portion of the lot occupied by such use on the effective date of this Chapter, or amendments thereto.
 - (3) *Abandonment.*
 - a. If a nonconforming use of land not involving a building or structure is abandoned or discontinued for any reason for a period greater than twelve (12) consecutive months, any subsequent use of the land not involving a building or structure shall conform to the requirements of this Chapter.
 - b. A nonconforming use of the land not involving a building or structure shall be determined to be abandoned or discontinued if the City is in receipt of a written declaration by the property owner that the nonconforming use of the land not involving a building or structure will not be continued, or if two (2) or more of the following conditions exist that demonstrate intent on the part of the property owner to abandon or discontinue the nonconforming use of the land not involving a building or structure:
 1. Foreclosure;

2. One (1) or more utility meters, such as water, gas, or electricity to the property, have been removed, disconnected, or shut-off;
3. The property and/or grounds are unsafe or unsanitary, as described in Chapter 14 Housing or Chapter 17 Nuisances;
4. Cessation of the nonconforming use or business operations during the abandonment or discontinuance period;
5. Removal of signs or other indications of the existence of the nonconforming use;
6. Removal of equipment for the operation of the nonconforming use;
7. Failure to maintain current licenses, certificates, permits, registrations or other appropriate documentation; or
8. Other actions which constitute an intention by the property owner or lessee to abandon or discontinue the nonconforming use.

c. Exceptions.

1. Abandonment will not be considered only when a property owner can provide documentation demonstrating a good faith effort to actively sell or lease the premises for a use less intense by function or operation than the previous nonconforming use. This exception shall not apply to discontinued nonconforming uses except as otherwise specifically set forth in this section.

(4) Change to Other Nonconforming Use of Land. Prior to a determination of abandonment or discontinuance, a nonconforming use shall only be changed to another nonconforming use provided the Zoning Board of Appeals makes all of the following determinations.

- a. The proposed use is equally compatible, or more compatible, with the surrounding neighborhood, and that the use is equal to or more conforming to the uses allowed in the zoning district than the previous nonconforming use.
- b. The proposed nonconforming use is not enlarged or increased, nor extended to occupy a greater area of land than the previous nonconforming use, except as may otherwise be permitted by the Zoning Board of Appeals.
- c. That buildings and area encompassing the expansion of the nonconforming use complies with all parking, landscaping, or other site development regulations applicable to the area affected by the proposed enlargement, increase or extension of use area as required by this Chapter.

(g) Repairs, Replacement, Alterations, or Improvements.

(1) Nonconforming Commercial or Industrial uses, structures or buildings.

- a. Should the total costs of repairs, replacement, alterations, or improvements to a nonconforming use, building or structure, for any reason, be less than or equal to seventy-four (74) percent of the assessed value of the building or structure, it may be repaired, replaced, altered, or improved in its previously nonconforming location, provided that:
 1. The dimensional characteristics of the building as it existed at the time of passage or amendment of this Chapter is not increased. This does not allow for the separation or expansion of utility systems; and
 2. The building, structure or use has not lost its nonconforming status due to abandonment.
- b. Should the total costs of repairs, replacement, alterations, or improvements to a nonconforming use, building or structure, for any reason, be greater than or equal to seventy-five (75) percent of the assessed value of the building or structure,, it shall be repaired, replaced, altered, or improved only in conformance with the provisions of this Chapter.

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- (2) *Nonconforming one-family uses, structures or buildings.* A nonconforming one-family detached dwelling and its accessory structures in any zoning districts may be continued, replaced, or repaired if damaged by fire, vandalism, flood or other force of nature, if approved by the zoning administrator or chief building official. Such approval requires a finding that the resulting building footprint and height will be the same size or smaller than that of the building or structure before such change. Replacement of a nonconforming one-family building or structure must commence within one (1) year of the date of damage and work must be diligently pursued toward completion. Failure to complete replacement or diligently work toward completion, or use of the building for a conforming non-residential use for any period of time, will result in the loss of nonconforming status unless good cause for the delay or temporary change in use is accepted by the zoning administrator or building official.
- (3) *Assessed Value.* For the purposes of enforcing the regulations contained in this section, the value (see the definition in Section 28-5 of this Chapter) of the structure will be determined by the most recent valuation of the structure for the purposes of taxation.
- (4) *Ordinary Repair/Maintenance.* Nothing in this section prevents ordinary repair/maintenance, or the strengthening or restoring to a safe condition of any building or structure, or part thereof, deemed to be unsafe by an official charged with protecting the public safety, upon order of such official.
- (h) *Nonconforming Site Design.*
- (1) *Purpose.* This Section permits reviews of applications for improvements and minor modifications to a nonconforming lot, building, structure or use that does not require a site to meet all of the site improvement regulations, requirements, and standards of this Chapter. Where appropriate, the intent is to allow gradual compliance with site-related requirements for sites that pre-date requirements for landscaping, surface treatment for parking areas or drives, curbing and other non-safety site-related items provided in Article IV.
- (2) *Improvements or Modifications.* Improvements or modifications to nonconforming site design may be administratively approved through the site plan review process without a complete upgrade of all site elements under the following conditions:
- a. The applicant provides reasonable site improvements to the site in relation to the scale and construction cost of the building improvements or expansion;
 - b. The applicant addresses any safety-related site issues for the site;
 - c. The improvements or minor expansion do not increase the nonconforming site elements;
 - d. The applicant upgrades the site landscaping consistent with Section 28-105, to the degree deemed appropriate by the zoning administrator or chief building official; and
 - e. Driveways that do not conform to the access management requirements of this Chapter are eliminated, provided that minimum reasonable access is maintained.
- (3) *Compliance Required.* Site design standards and requirements shall be brought into full compliance with this Chapter, except as may otherwise be permitted by the Zoning Board of Appeals, if any of the following occur:
- a. Change from nonconforming use to a permitted use.
 1. See Section 28-130(b).
 - b. *Parking Lot/Area.* Any expansion, reduction, resurfacing, replacement, or reconstruction of greater than or equal to twenty-five (25) percent of the existing designated off-street parking area shall require all new, existing, and/or remaining off-street parking area(s), maneuvering lanes, and ingress and egress meet the standards and requirements of Article IV. This does not include general maintenance; i.e. sealcoating.
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- c. Modification, alteration, replacement, or expansion of existing landscape areas (trees, shrubs, ground cover, or similar materials). This shall also include all proposed landscape installations.
 - d. Replacement of nonconforming exterior light fixtures, light poles, or combination thereof shall meet the requirement of Section 28-109.
- (4) Nothing in this Section shall be construed to require the removal of vegetation preserved as part of the original construction of the landscaped area.
- (5) In all instances, required screening walls for waste receptacles, fencing of outdoor storage or screening from adjacent residential uses shall be provided.
- (6) The City may require a performance guarantee under the provisions of Section 28-165 to insure that all improvements required in this Section are made in accordance with the approved plan.
- (i) *Nonconforming signs.*
- (3) The goal is to eliminate nonconforming signs, except as otherwise specifically set forth in this section. Any lawfully erected sign, which is made unlawful by this chapter, may continue exactly as the sign existed at the time when the sign became unlawful under the provisions of this Chapter. However, following ninety (90) days after the discontinuance of the previously approved use associated with the sign, sign panels shall be replaced with blank panels and any interior lighting shall be disconnected. Twelve (12) months after discontinuance, the sign structure shall be removed.
- (4) No nonconforming sign shall:
- a. Be changed to another nonconforming sign without a variance;
 - b. Be structurally altered so as to change the shape, size, type or design of the sign;
 - c. Be re-established after the activity, business or use to which it relates has been discontinued for ninety (90) days or longer.
- (5) Ordinary repair/maintenance.
- a. The provisions of this Chapter shall not apply to the ordinary repair/maintenance of existing signs or changing of sign panels or to the altering of a sign specifically designed for periodic change of message without change in sign structure, such as a bulletin board or similar type of sign. The replacement of a manual changeable message sign with a digital message sign is specifically excluded from this provision.
 - b. Repairs may be done to a nonconforming sign to an extent not exceeding fifty (50%) percent of the value of the sign, provided that:
 - i. The dimensional characteristics of the sign as it existed at the time of passage or amendment of this Chapter is not increased; and
 - ii. The sign has not lost its nonconforming status due to vacancy, discontinuance or abandonment.
 - c. In the event that any nonconforming sign requires ordinary repair/maintenance for any reason and in any manner that exceeds fifty (50%) percent of the value of the sign, such repairs shall be permitted only in conformity with the provisions of this Chapter. However, if complying with this Chapter is unfeasible and/or impractical, a property owner may seek a variance from the Zoning Board of Appeals (see Section 28-238 of this Chapter), assuming it can also be demonstrated that the original structure was consistent with the established character of the area.
- (j) Nonconforming medical and adult use marijuana facility uses. Medical and adult use marijuana facilities, including a grower, provisioning center, retailer, safety compliance facility, secure transporter, microbusiness, or any marijuana facility or establishment of any type, other than that of a licensed caregiver operating within the limits of the Michigan Medical Marijuana Act, which may have been
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established prior to the effective date of this ordinance, but which have not gained a license from both the State of Michigan and the City of Jackson shall not be considered nonconforming uses. In addition, no marihuana facilities may be permitted as a home occupation or accessory use.

SUMMARY

On March 8, 2022, City Council approved the award of the 2022 As Needed Materials Testing Services Contract to Professional Service Industries (PSI), Inc. of Lansing Michigan in the amount of \$125,205.00. This contract is subject to two 1-year extensions with a two and a half percent unit price adjustment per year. PSI has submitted the attached letter indicating their desire to renew the contract to provide materials testing services for the 2023 construction season.

BUDGETARY CONSIDERATIONS

Engineering is requesting that the first extension be approved in the estimated amount of \$125,000.00. This amount will cover the costs for materials testing on the various construction projects that the City will undertake in 2023. This work will be paid for out of various project accounts in the Major Street Fund, Local Street Fund, Sewer Fund and Water Fund.

HISTORY, BACKGROUND and DISCUSSION

The City of Jackson has annually, for several decades, entered into a professional services contract with an engineering firm to provide testing services to ensure that specifications are met regarding the provision and placement of various materials on the City's construction projects. This is an industry wide standard practice and a requirement for those projects that are funded in part or in whole by state and/or federal grants.

SUMMARY

The Jackson Fire Department's Central Station at 518 North Jackson Street has several overhead doors which allow fire apparatus to leave and enter the station coming to and from calls for service. These doors have not been replaced in more than 25 years, and they are falling into disrepair.

BUDGETARY CONSIDERATIONS

Bids were solicited for the project. A bid from the Overhead Door Company for \$94,145 was the only bid received. Their bid is over the amount budgeted in FY 22/23 by \$19,145. That overage would be offset by the under-budget bid of R.W. Mercer for the Central Station window project.

HISTORY, BACKGROUND and DISCUSSION

The overhead doors at Station #1 open and close every time a fire apparatus or non-emergency administrative vehicle leave or return to the station. This means the doors are operating multiple times each day. This wear and tear has resulted in frequent repairs to the doors, controllers, and wiring. New doors will also improve the energy efficiency of the building.

DISCUSSION OF THE ISSUE

The Fire Department would save on energy costs in future years, as well as save on maintenance and repair costs.

POSITION

I recommend accepting the bid by the Overhead Door Company for the overhead door project at the Central Fire Station.







SUMMARY

The Jackson Fire Department's Central Station at 518 North Jackson Street has been the primary station since it was built in 1962. The windows in the building are those originally installed during its construction. More than 60 years have passed, and the windows are in dire need of replacement.

BUDGETARY CONSIDERATIONS

Bids were solicited for the project. A bid from R. W. Mercer for \$86,600 was the only bidder who submitted all required documents. Their bid is under the amount budgeted in FY 22/23.

HISTORY, BACKGROUND and DISCUSSION

Since the early 1960s when the building was built, much has changed in the construction field. Advances have been made to make windows more energy-efficient and with safer materials. The current windows are degrading with each passing year, and there are concerns surrounding the asbestos used as construction materials in the past.

DISCUSSION OF THE ISSUE

The Fire Department would save on energy costs in future years, which will add to the cost savings with Mercer's bid be under the budgeted amount. This project would also make the building safer for the firefighters who work there.

POSITION

I recommend accepting the bid by R.W. Mercer for the windows update project at the Central Fire Station.

HISTORY, BACKGROUND and DISCUSSION

The Jackson Public Arts Commission was asked to curate an art sculpture for the MLK Roundabout in June of 2022. The Commission decided to create a subcommittee and invite commissioners from the MLK Corridor Authority, Racial Equity Commission and City Council Ward person.

The Committee was formed with Arlene Robinson City Councilperson Ward 1, Kesha Hamilton Chair of the Racial Equity Commission, George Brown Commissioner from the MLK Corridor Authority, and from the Public Arts Commission Chairperson Angela Edward and Commissioner Janet Meyer Jackman. The Committee met several times starting in July of 2022. The call for art went out nationwide in August with a due date of November 1, 2022.

The committee received 12 artist applications. Committee members reviewed each of the applications on group scoring system set up by the Jackson Public Arts Commission. The group collaborated, shared scores and narrowed down their selections to three artist. The artist were Maxwell Emcays, Ken Thompson, Doug Jones and Chris Turner. Each artist went through zoom interviews and were allowed to submit two art pieces. After this point we planned for an open house at the MLK Center on January 4, 2023.

DISCUSSION OF THE ISSUE

The City of Jackson has presented four art sculptures after six month process by the MLK Roundabout Committee. The committee worked hard to be inclusive and transparent to reach as many citizens as they could for public comment. The Public was able to interact through social media, email and in person with each artist.

I have been able to communicate with engineers, the foundries, fabricators and the clients in a manner that ensured a clear expectation of deliverables. In addition, despite being new to bronze I have been able to reduce foundry production time by 40% through the expanded use of 3D printing, as well as push the limits of details in the model to the extent of even including fine jewelry and eyelashes in the bronze cast (which is rare). This approach has allowed me to be consistent with schedule expectations and deliver on budget.

I am confident that I can create a work of art within the budget and timeline that is innovative, heartfelt, and limitless in its potential to truly connect and engage with the City of Jackson. It is my goal to create a piece that becomes a beacon for the beautiful potential we all hold.

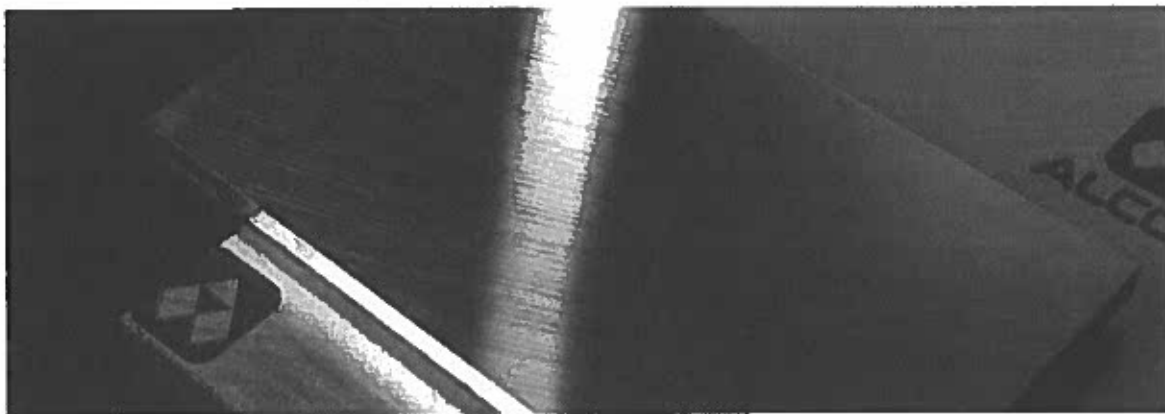
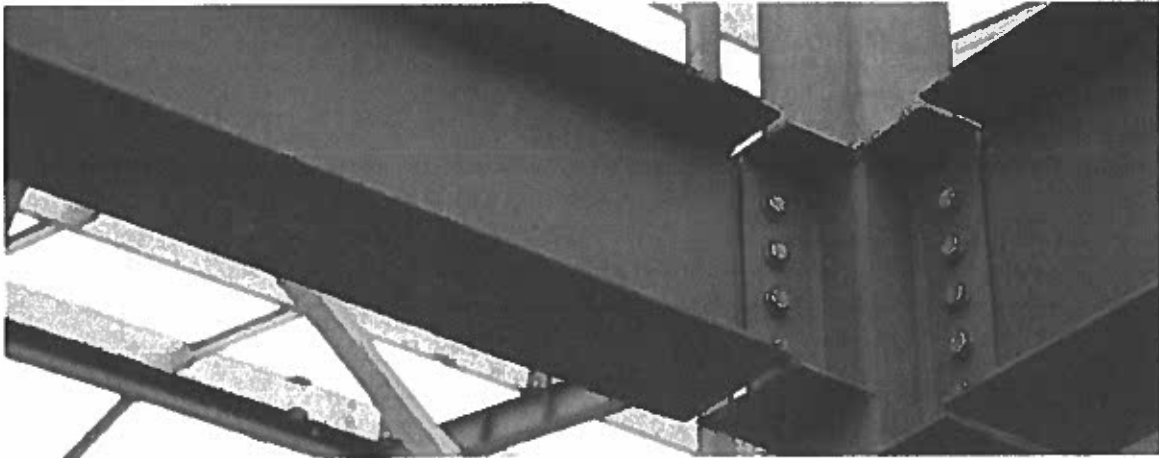

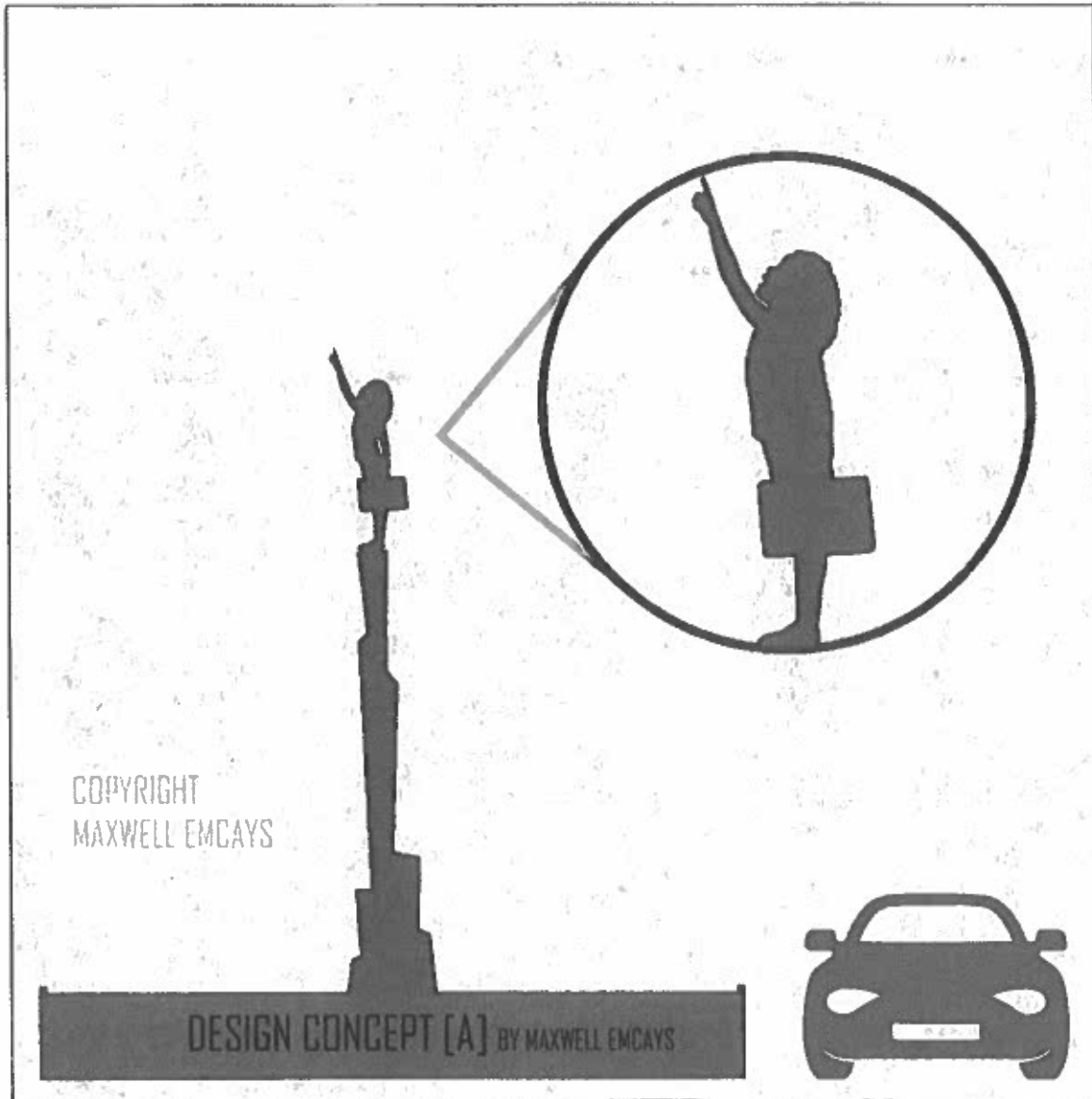
My material and design direction considers not only the ideas and sentiment of the community but also factors allotted budget and location.

Material: Non-corrosive structural steel for internal support, and anodized aluminum for the primary decorative component.



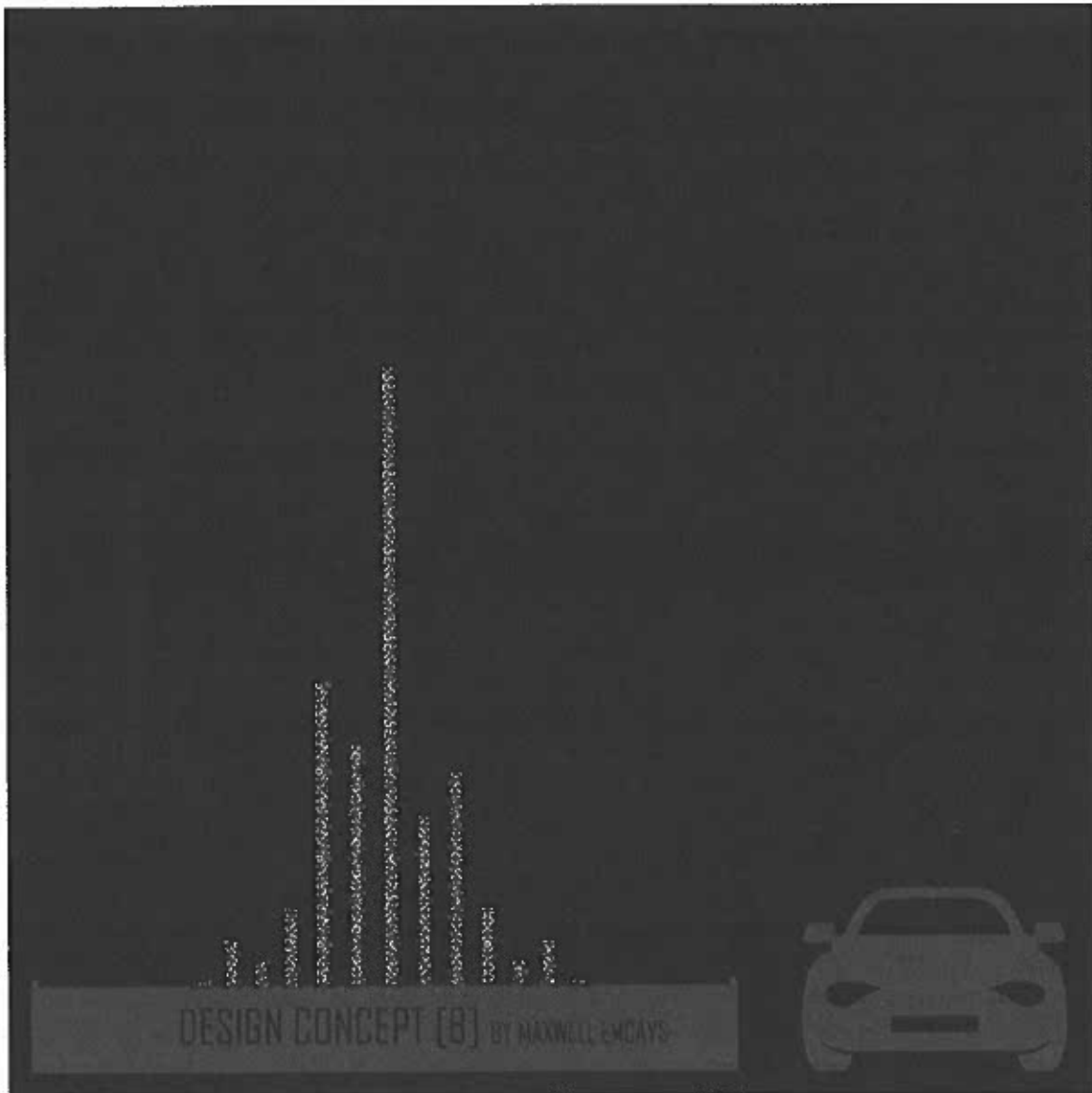

and finalization. While the budget is extremely tight, I have worked to be as imaginative as possible within those limitations.



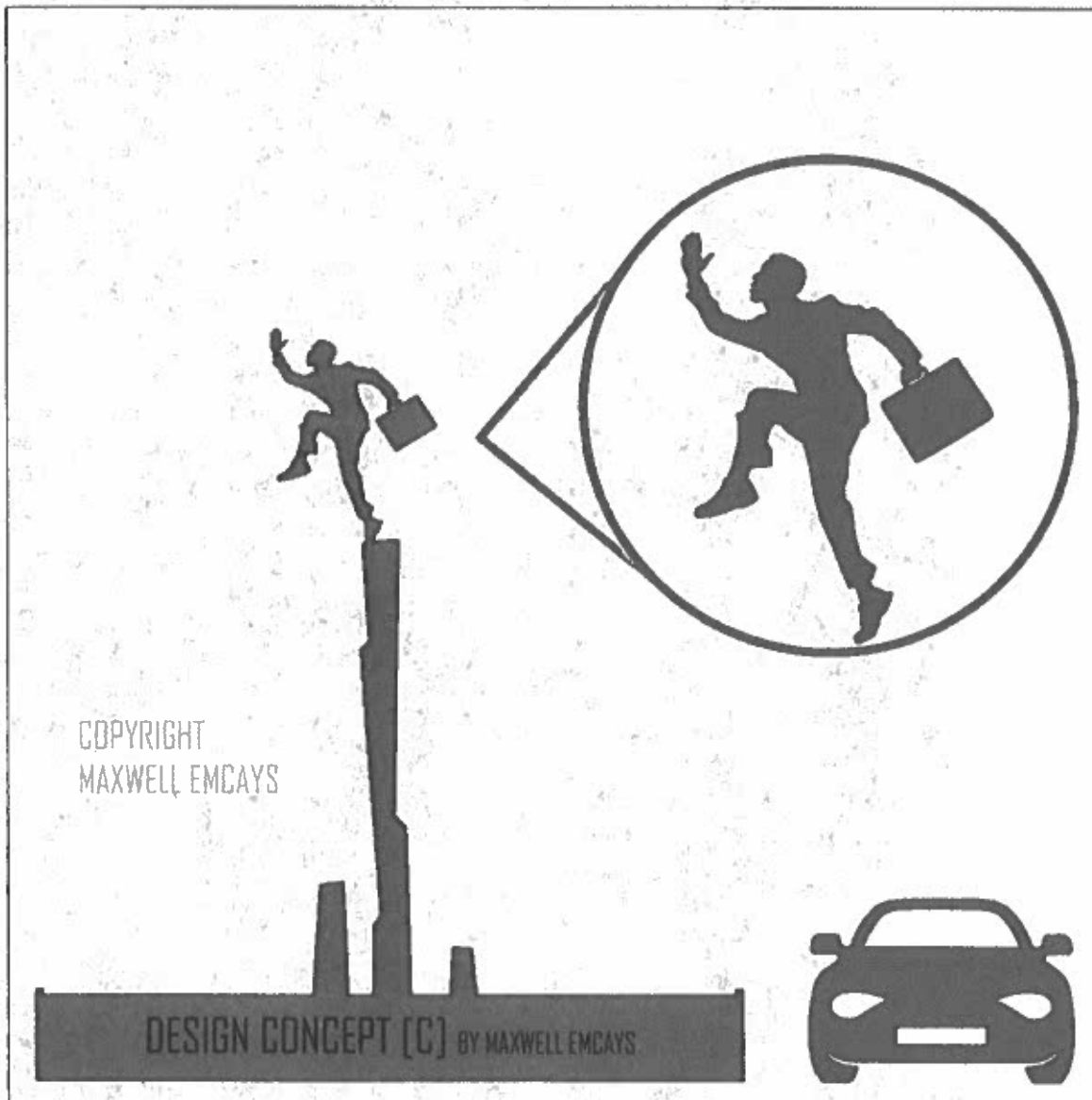

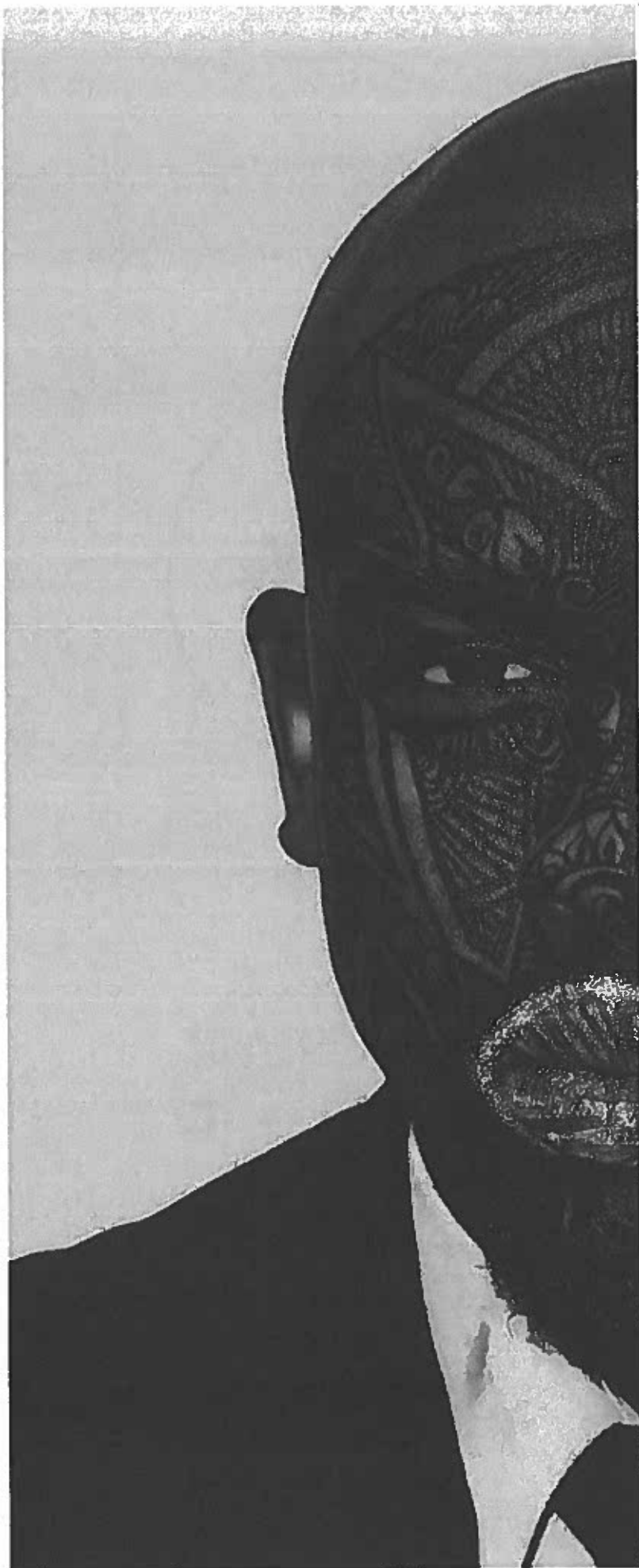
Design B is titled "Path to Progress". Depicted here in a night view as it would be well illuminated from the inside of the pillars. The pillars reference a graph of progress. As one can note, the pillars do not consistently increase, but rather have an "up and down" portrayal while yet progressing. This is a reminder that progress will be filled with setbacks, but yet we will reach our heights.

Material / Method. The piece will feature laser cut aluminum panels with steel support and concrete foundation.



Design C is titled "Leap of faith".

The concept aligns again with the mountaintop mantra but portrays a leap of faith beyond the mountaintop. This echoes the many moments and ways Black people have been required to act on faith in order to progress much like those million who migrated in the 1900s to areas like Jackson Michigan.

I would like to encourage one of Maxwell Emcays sculptures for the MLK roundabout. For one, the other proposed sculptures are, frankly, neither inviting nor approachable. They are what I think most would consider "high brow art" and if anything, not reflective of the intersection in question.

This is not a business hub that is attempting to draw tourism - it's a neighborhood. In any direction you go, you are propelling into a community - families and churches and schools; friends and neighbors. We don't want to put a nouveau construct that invites criticism or confusion. The community deserves a symbol - a metaphor that reflects the values that already serve the community itself: hope, togetherness. I have reviewed the selection for roundabout proposals.

I must say, that only one of these proposals strikes me as worthy of being erected as one of the first images people see upon entering downtown Jackson. "Over the Mountain Top" is the only statue which represents something valuable and has real aesthetic value. It's straightforward in the message it conveys and inspired on lookers. "The tower of us" at least conforms to some aesthetic properties and has some wholesome qualities, but it is neither beautiful to look at nor does it inspire awe or wonder. "MLK Boulevard arch" and "Community of Shapes" have no alluring qualities to them. They are not beautiful, they do not inspire, what they represent is not straightforward and obvious, and have no redeeming aesthetic qualities. They exist simply to take up space. The roundabout would be better off without any statue than either of these eye soars taking up the space.

Citizens of Jackson deserve to be surrounded by art and architecture that affirms the dignity of the human spirit, is beautiful, and produces joy, inspiration, and happiness. The only statue that comes close to this is "Over the Mountain Top." The other three, especially "MLK Boulevard arch" and "Community of Shapes" fail to do this, and would do nothing good for our community besides be a vanity project.

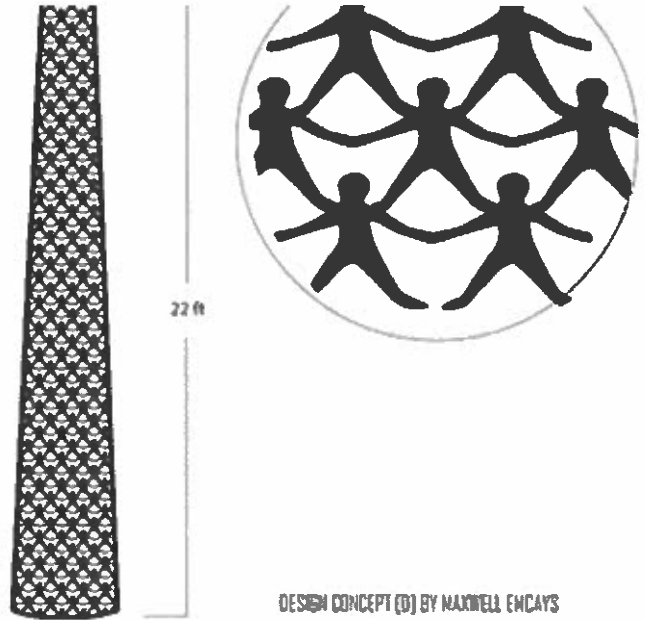

I would like to encourage one of Maxwell Emcays sculptures for the MLK roundabout. For one, the other proposed sculptures are, frankly, neither inviting nor approachable. They are what I think most would consider “high brow art” and if anything, not reflective of the intersection in question.

This is not a business hub that is attempting to draw tourism - it’s a neighborhood. In any direction you go, you are propelling into a community - families and churches and schools; friends and neighbors. We don’t want to put a nouveau construct that invites criticism or confusion. The community deserves a symbol - a metaphor that reflects the values that already serve the community itself: hope, togetherness. I believe that Emcays has captured that metaphor and provides a cultural signpost to remind us where we are in the city: we’re in a neighborhood, surrounded by people who look out for one another. Families and friends, hopes and dreams. 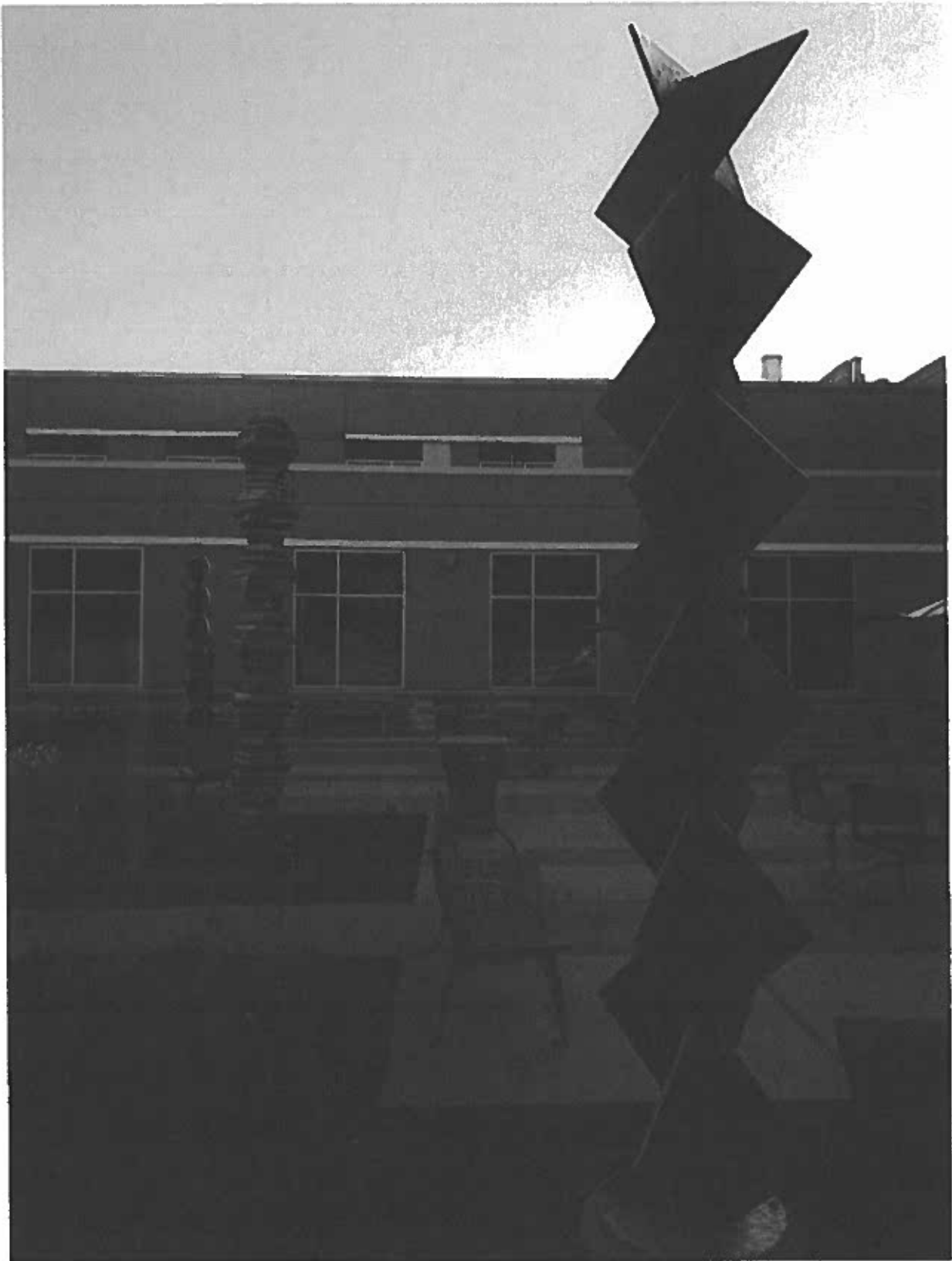




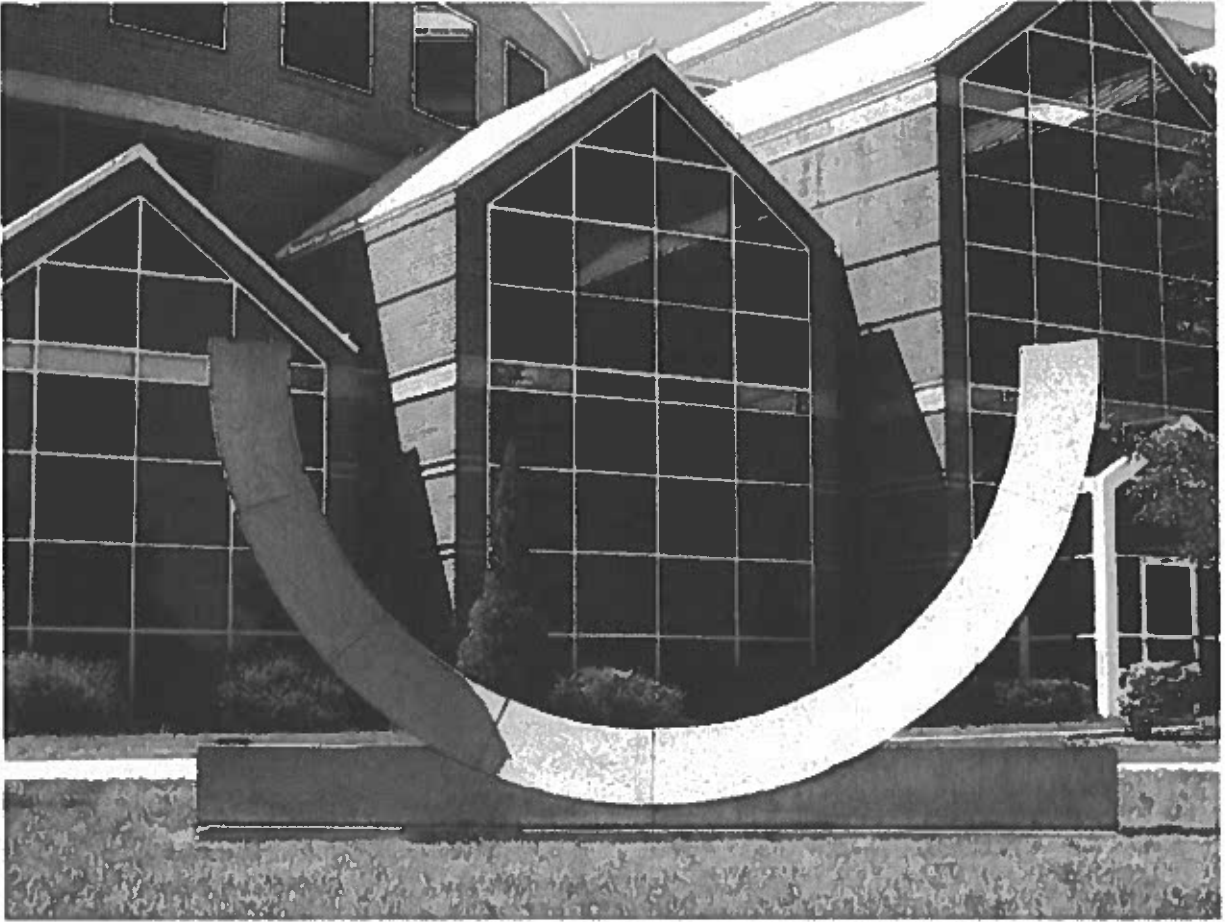


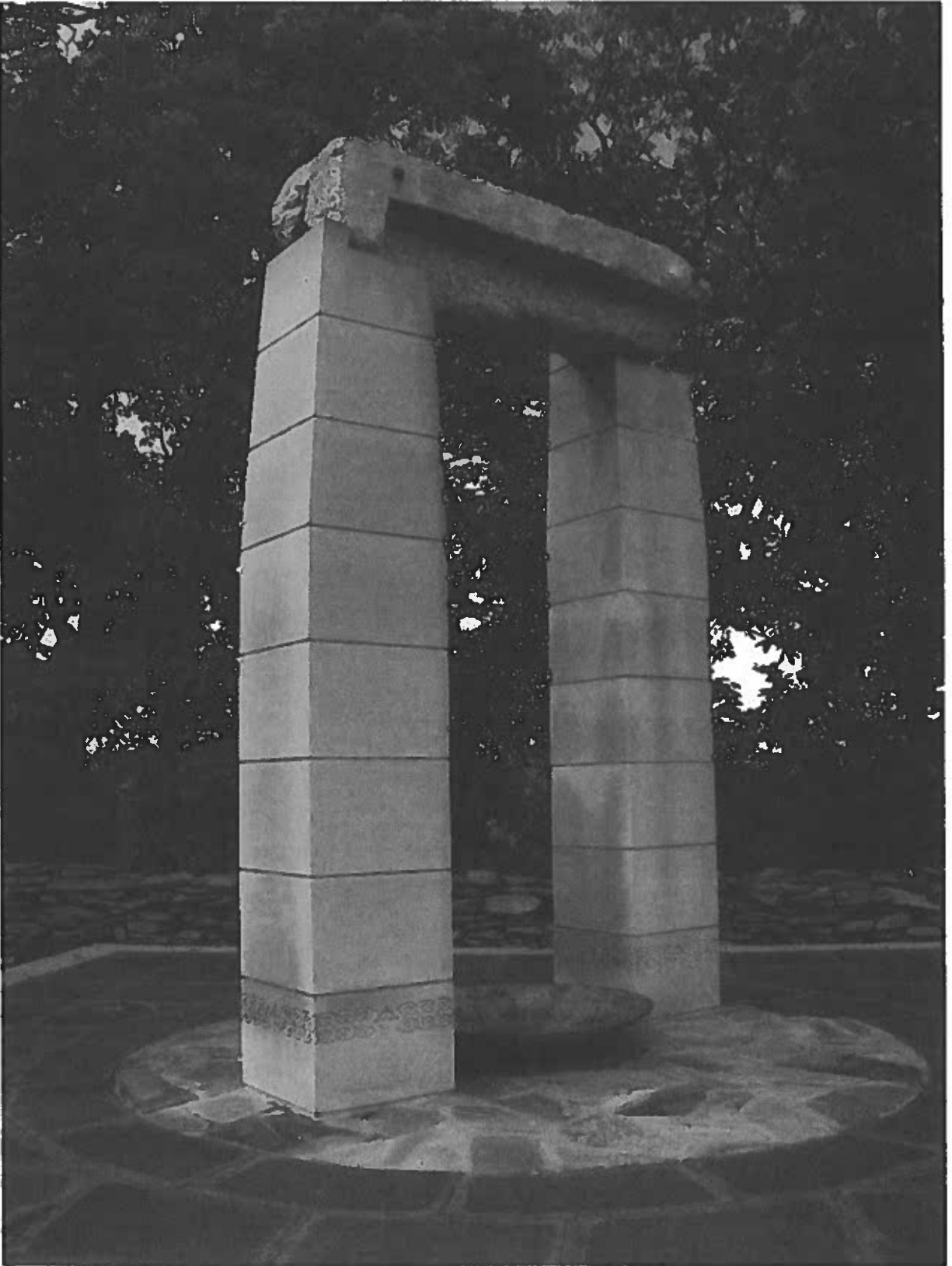




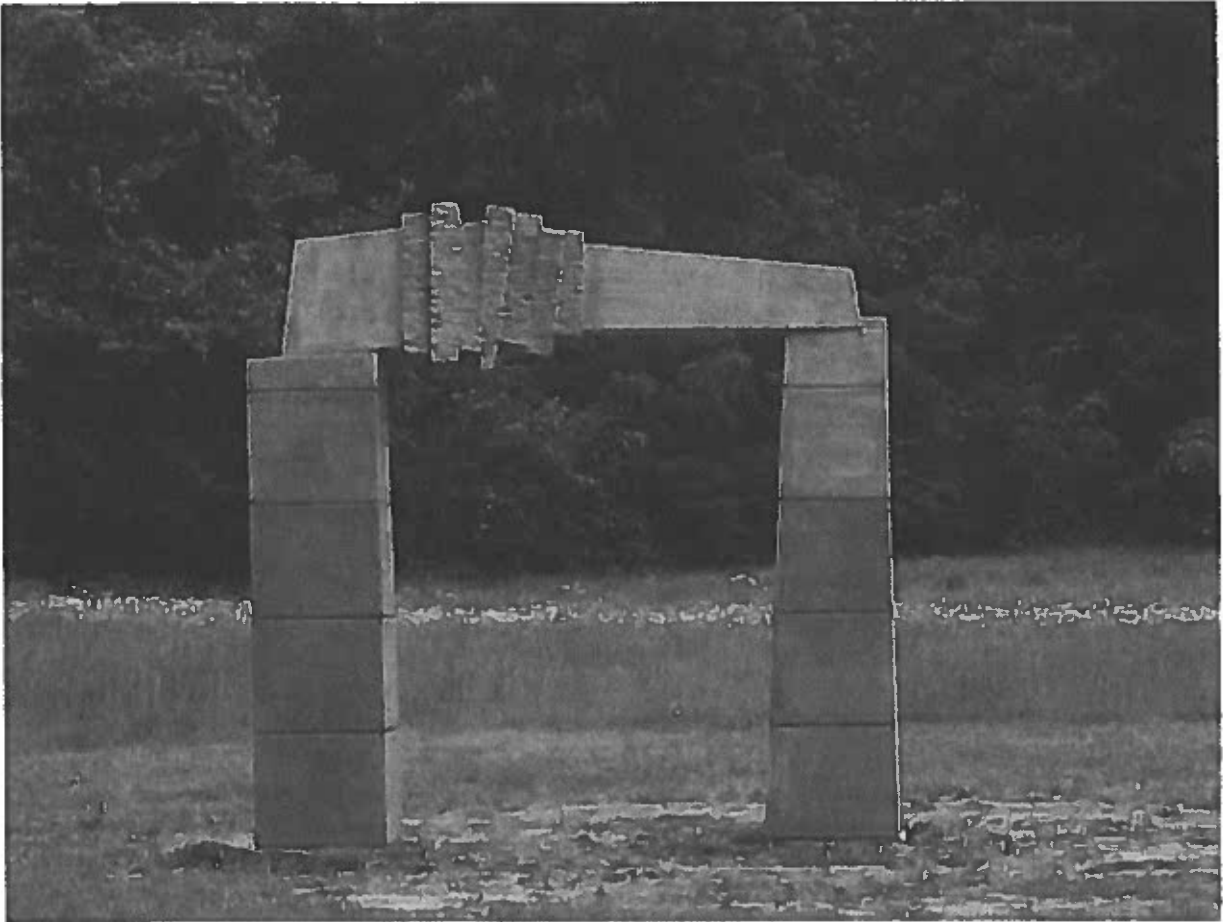




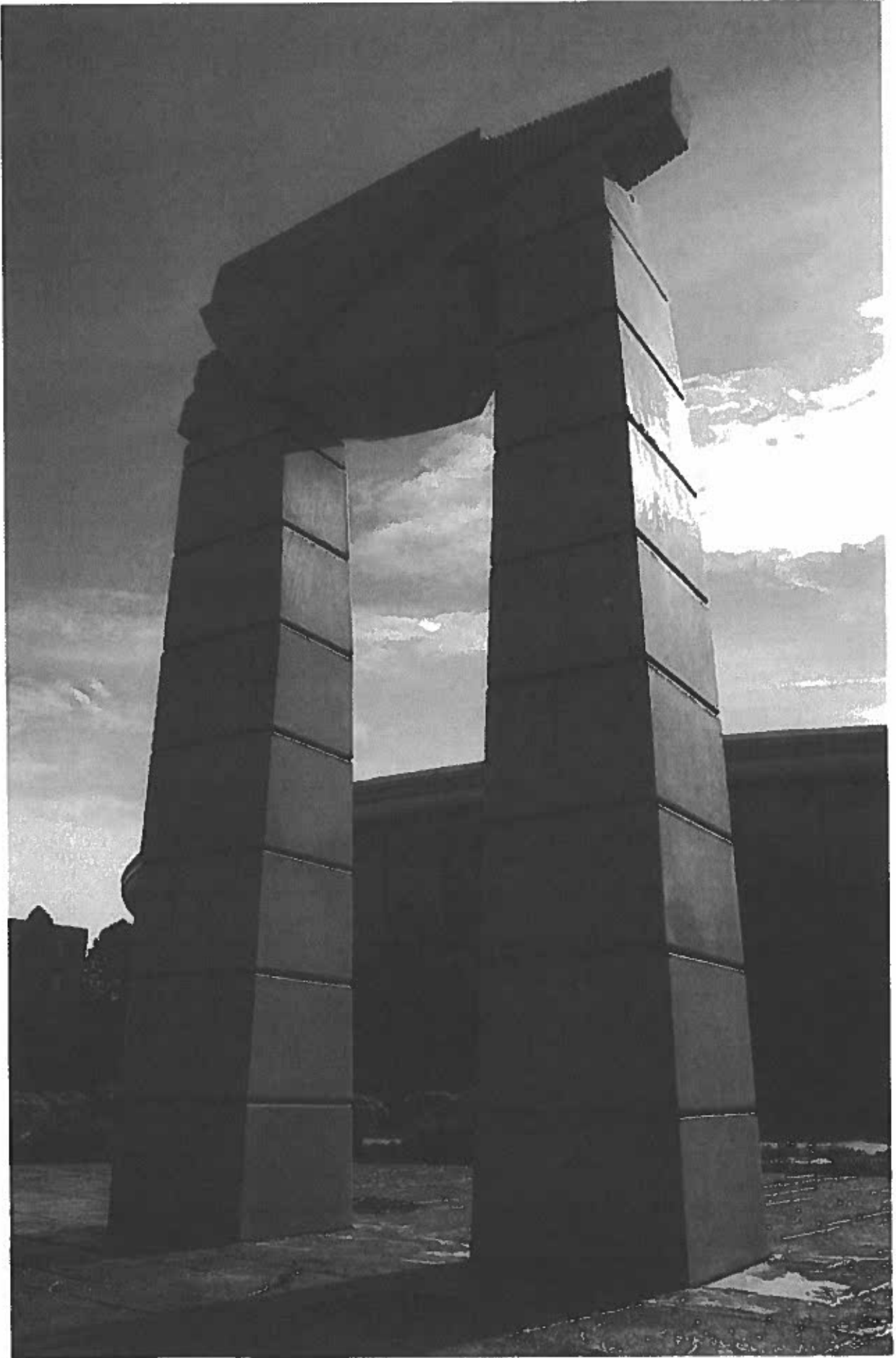






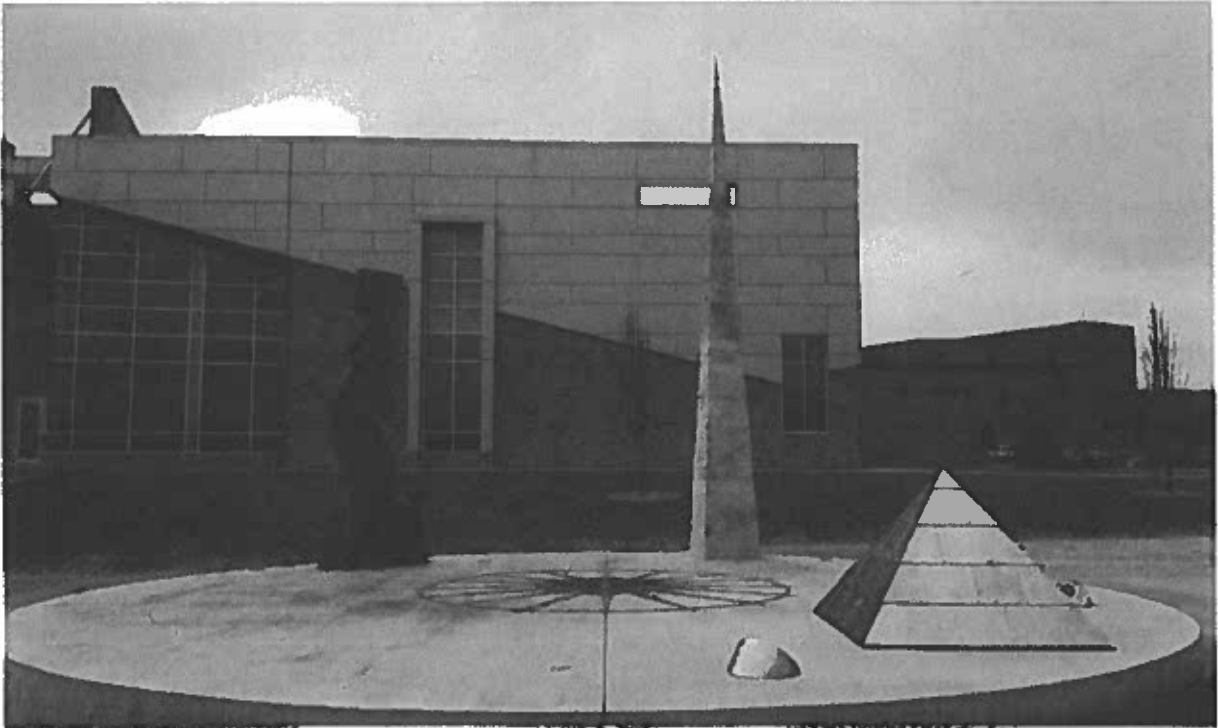






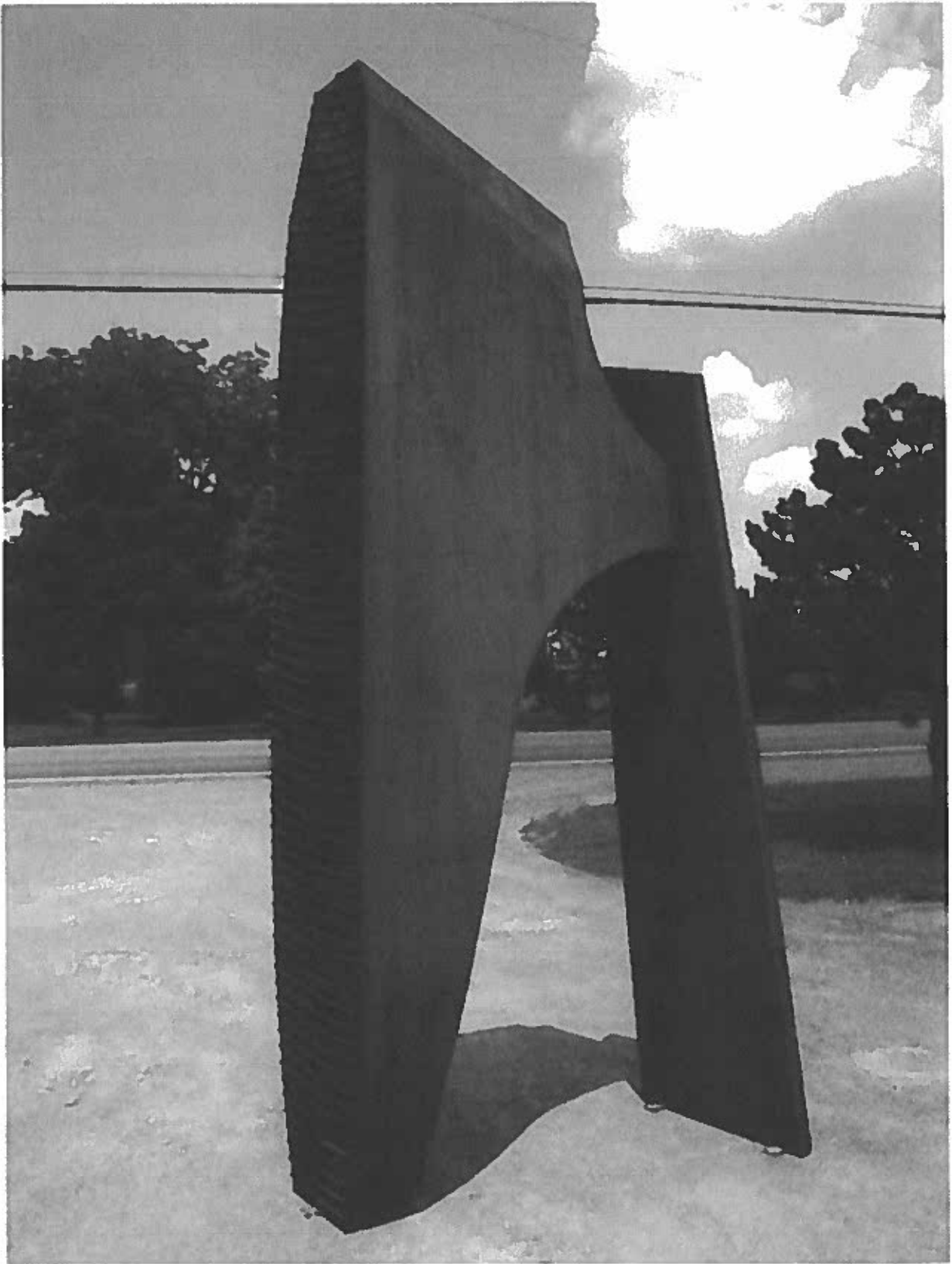


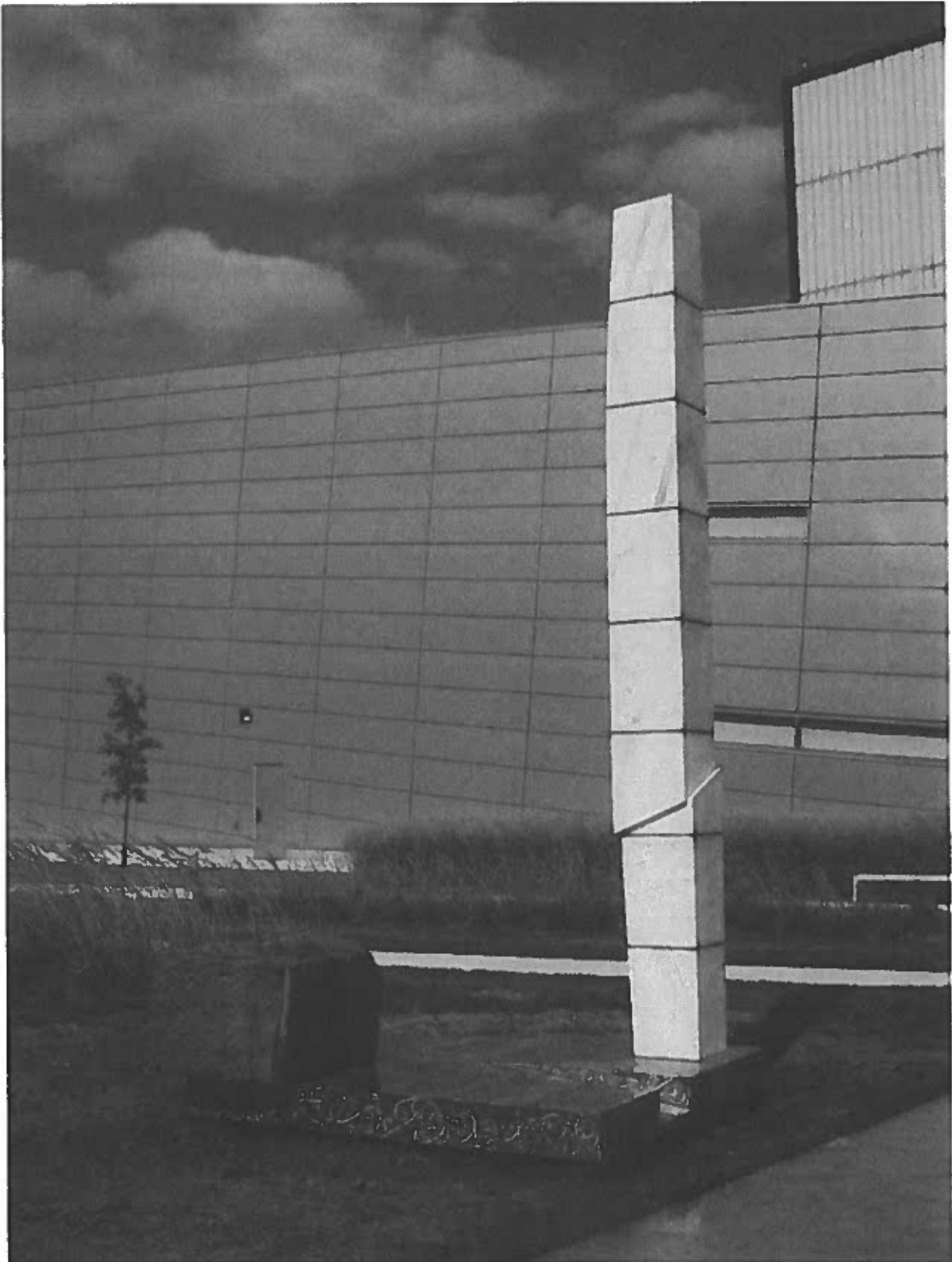


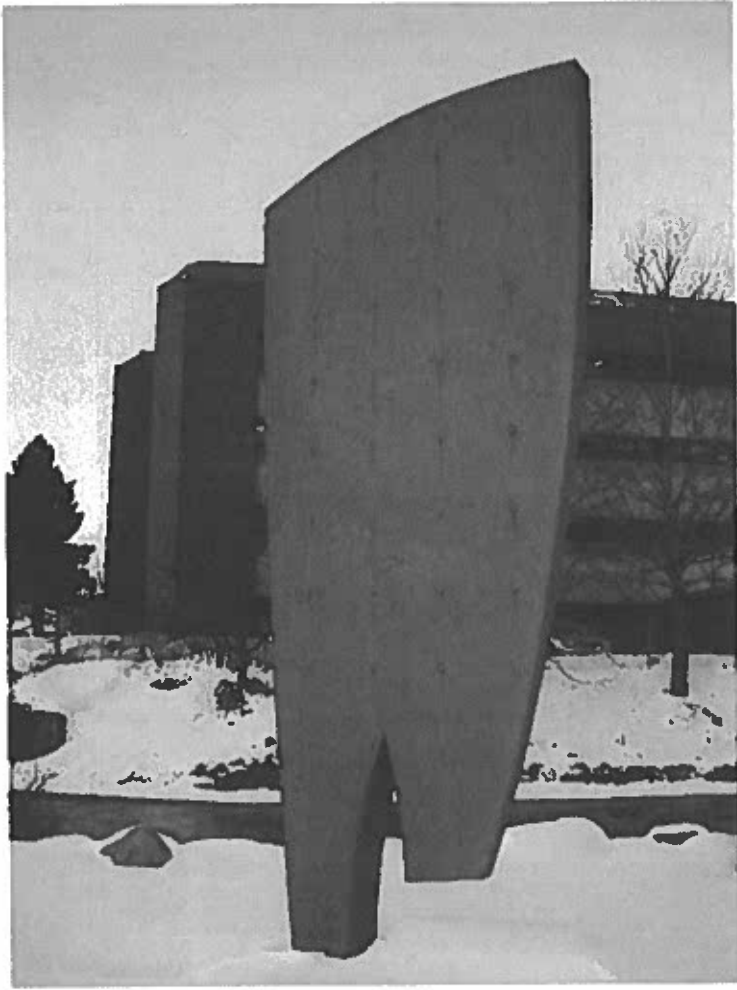




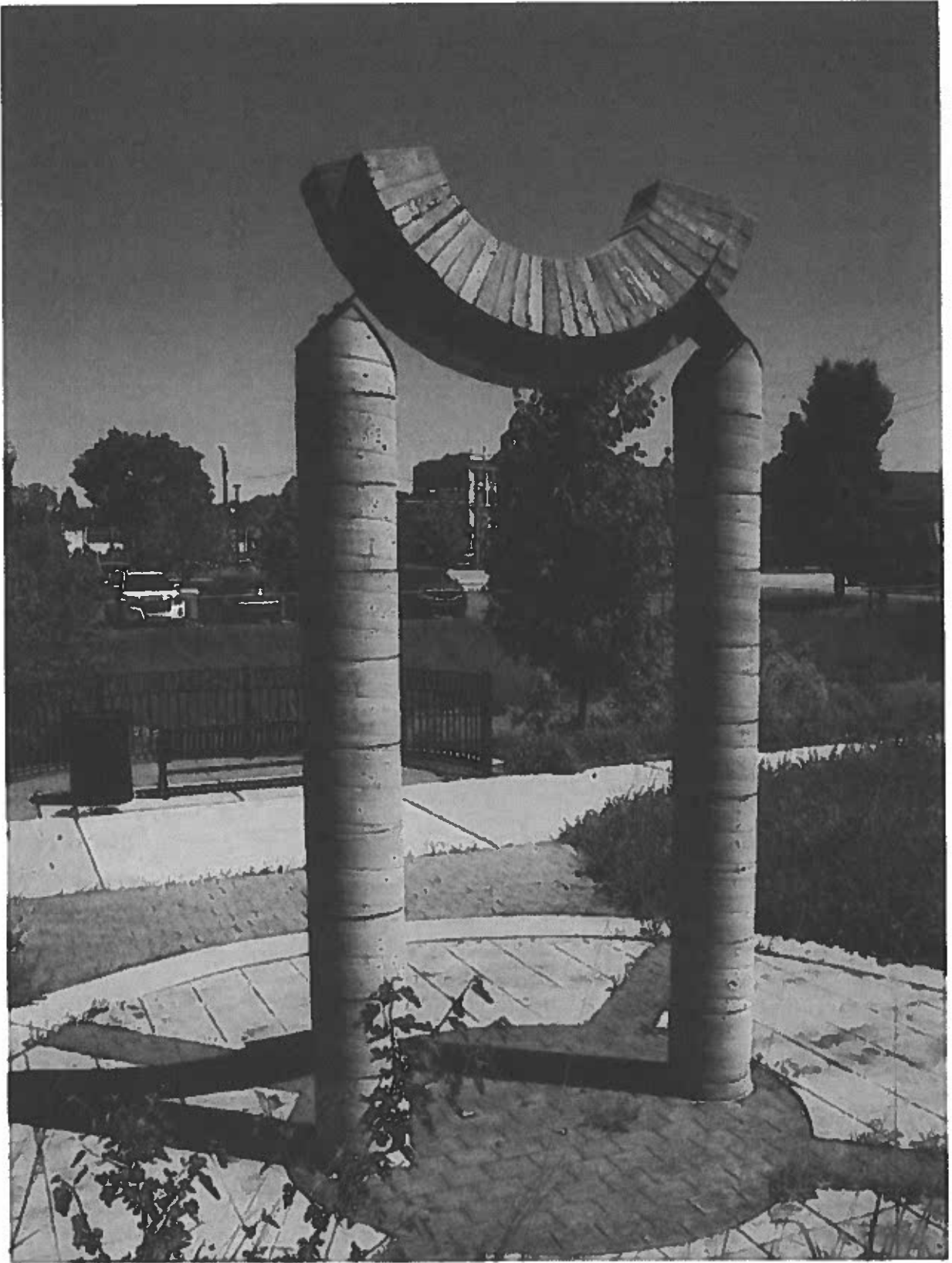




















Artist Statement

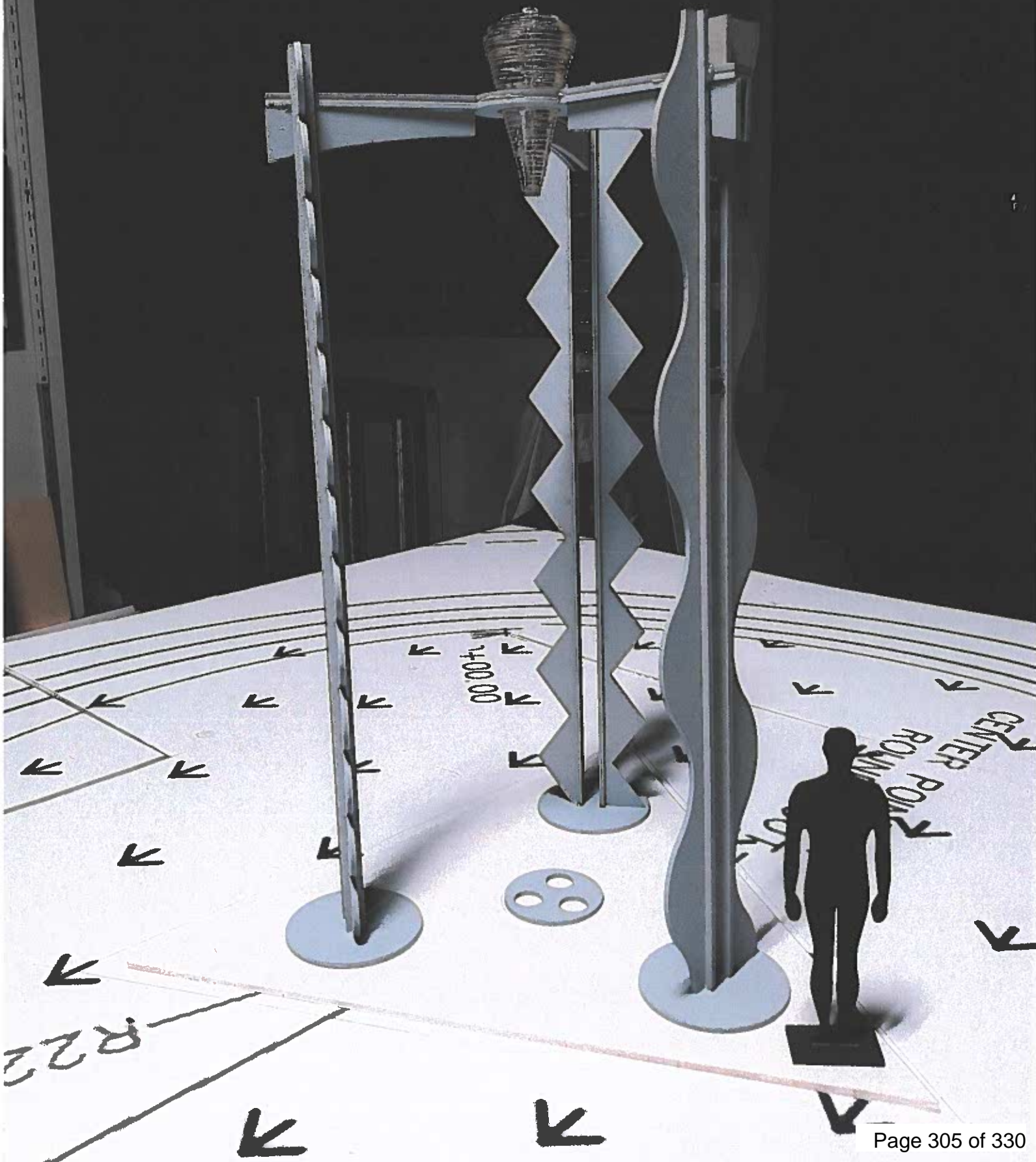
M L King Boulevard Arch (Look-up and dream!)

I have always had a fascination with architecture, in particular columns and arches. The arch is a powerful symbol that denotes an entry or new beginning, in this case to/for the South End of Jackson.

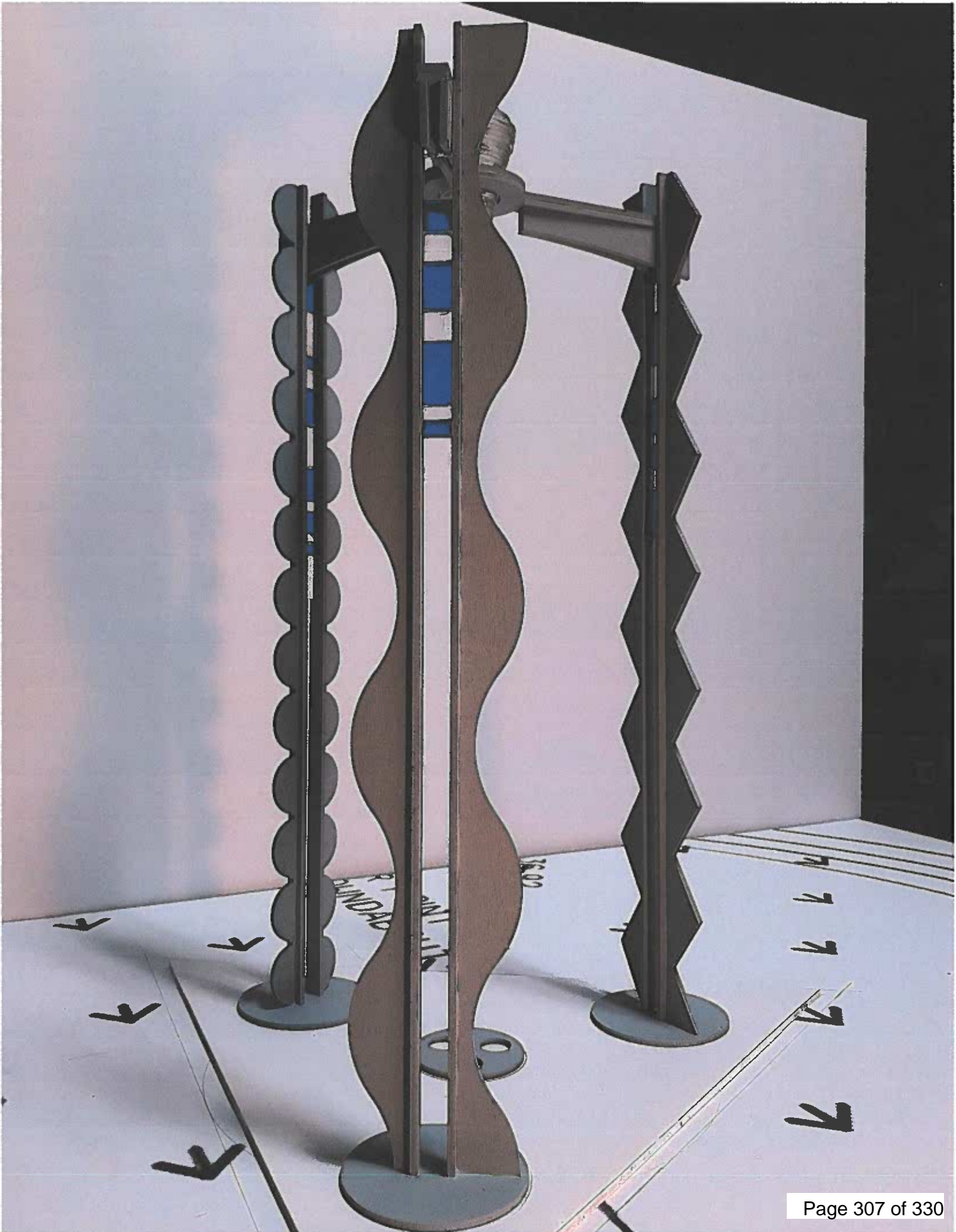
The three supporting columns and the glass patterns near the top derive their inspiration from details in the architecture of the surrounding neighborhoods. Each column is intentionally different to reflect the diversity within the community. At the top, the columns are 'unified' with the 'Y' shaped lintel that supports an illuminated 'orb' that represents our collective hope and dreams.

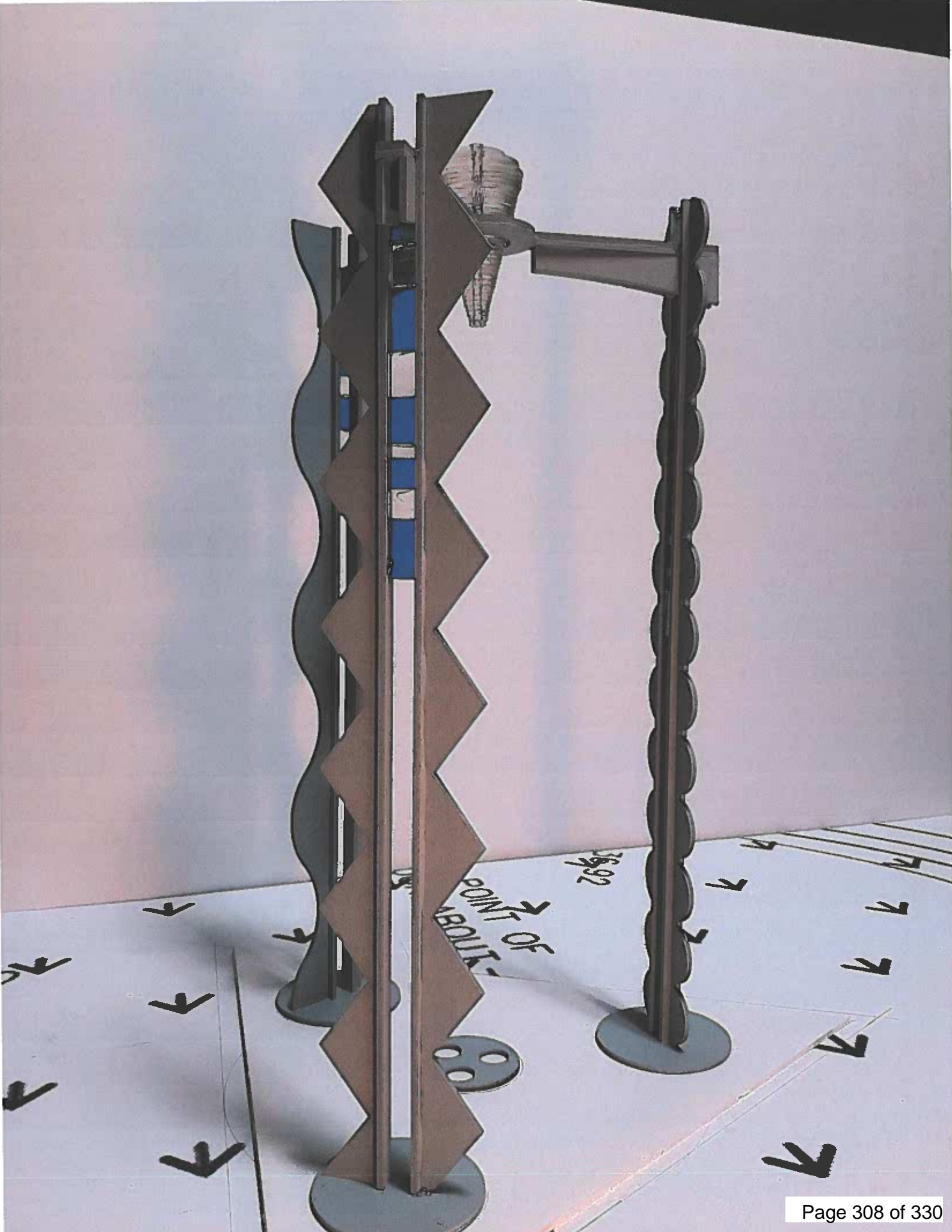
Facts about this proposal:

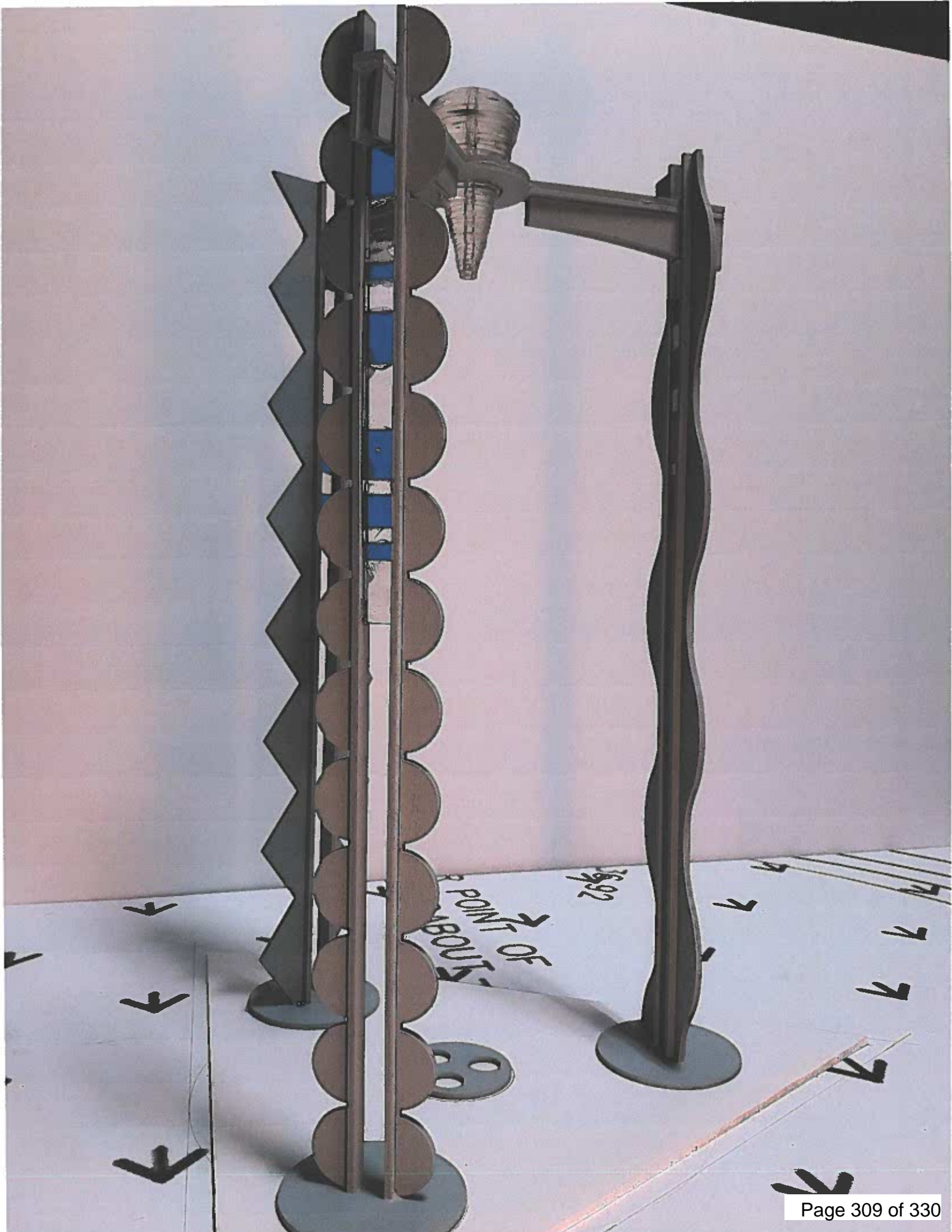
- The columns are 18'0 tall and made from W16-26# wide flange steel beams.
- The column inserts are ¾" x 6" cast glass panels of various lengths. They will vary in intensity with the available light.
- The 'orb' is fabricated from layers of laser-cut 1" SAR Acrylic sheet corrected for ultra-violet light. At night, the layers will refract the light and it will glow!
- The sculpture is light from the bottom at the center with three LED spot lights that most importantly illuminate the 'orb' and the other features become secondary.

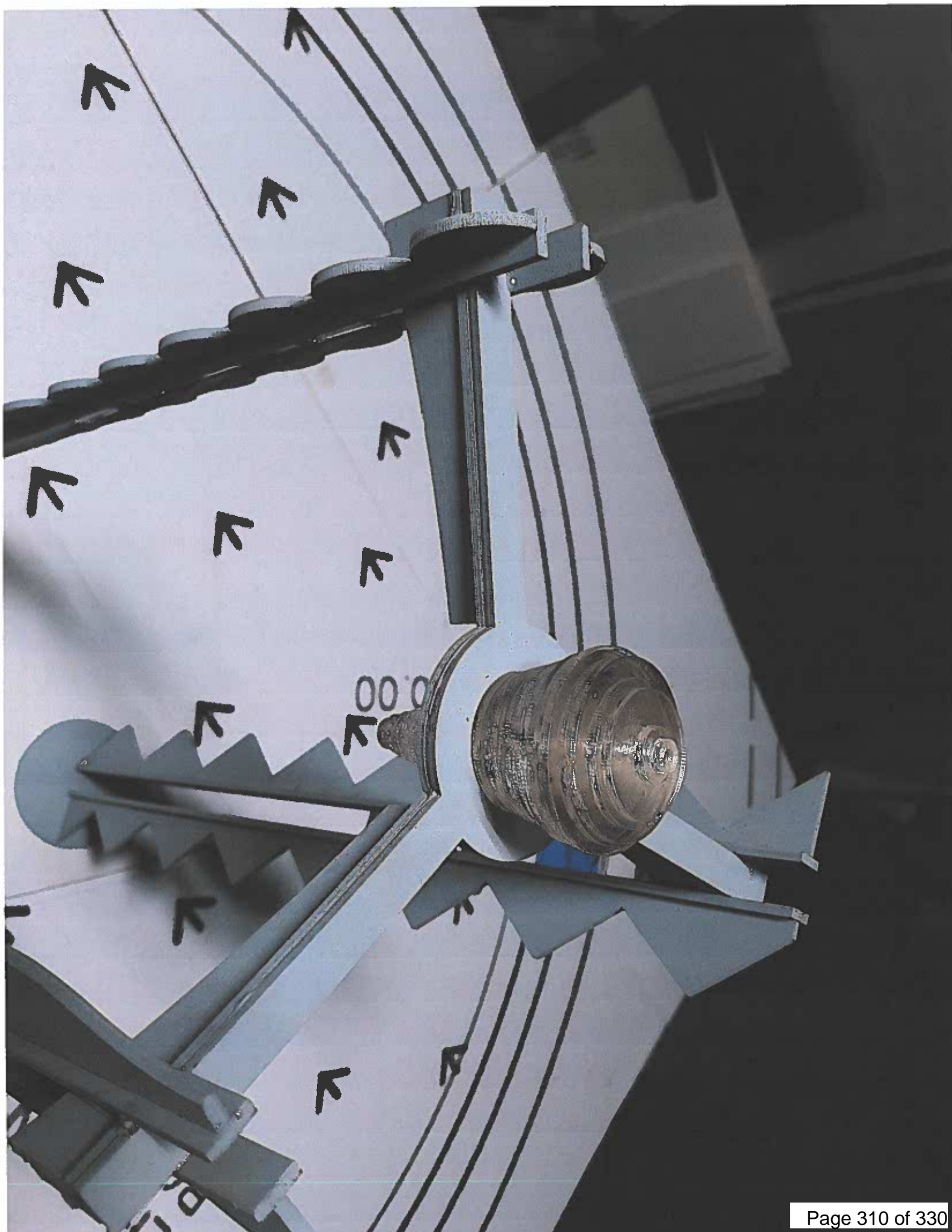


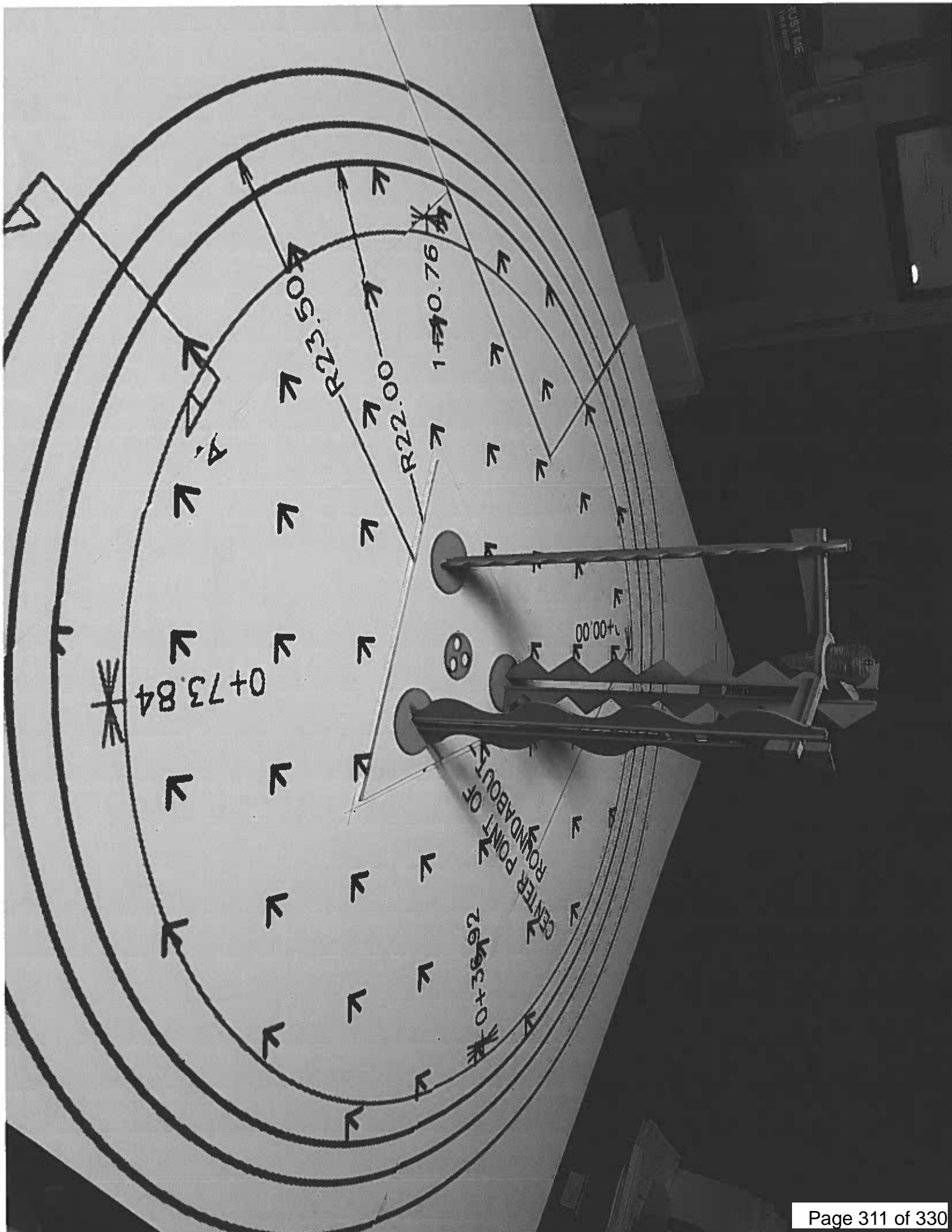
